Arrel's Specific Ancestors

Perhaps a reasonable way to cover my "recent ancestors" is to start with myself (not officially an ancestor as of this writing, but maybe soon!) and work backwards into the past. Arrel Dwayne Toews (1; #s refer to pedigree chart on p 50) was born in St. Mary's Hospital Annex in Enid OK on 22 July 1948, the second son of David Abraham and Rosa Marie Voth Toews. My older brother Galen came along about 3 years before I was born (26 November 1945; Colorado Springs CO), and my younger brother Myron about 3 years after me (15 May 1951; Enid OK). So yes, I was caught in the middle! But really, a perfect place to be! We all grew up on a farm about 1.5 miles W of Kremlin OK - to me, it was a busy farmstead with a very nice 2-story farmhouse; a great place for me to grow up! My father inherited our home-place from his father and mother's estate, and we also owned a "40" in the SW corner of the farm to the E, previously the domain of my Great-Grandfather, Heinrich J Buller (Uncle Henry G Toews, banker and owner of the Bank of Kremlin, had the remaining 120 acres of that farm). Arrel's Parents









David Abraham Toews (2), my father, was born on 20 October 1916 on our family farm ~1.5 mi W of Kremlin, OK (NE/4-20-24N-6W), the youngest of six children (Clara, Henry, Peter Isaac, Jacob, & Anna - "Aunt Bush") and he passed from this earth at the age of 87 on 12 December 2003 in Enid, OK. His wife (my mother) Rosa Marie (Voth) Toews (3), was born 15 September 1918 on the Butler Place (N across from our Houghtaling Farm) near Kremlin OK and she passed away in Enid OK on 25 February 1998 at age 79. Rosa and David were married on 3 August 1943 in the North Enid Mennonite Brethren Church. Mom said it was so hot on their wedding day that the candles drooped and almost fell out of the candelabra!









Deeply devout and genuinely true to his Mennonite heritage, roots, and pacifist beliefs, my father served in <u>Civilian Public Service Camp #5</u>, administered by the Mennonite Central Committee, near Colorado Springs, CO, as a conscientious objector to military service during World War II. He also spent time training to cook at <u>CPS Camp 4 near Grottoes, VA</u> under the tutelage of <u>Mary Emma Showalter</u>, the doyenne of Mennonite cooking and author of the iconic <u>Mennonite Community Cookbook</u>. Dad is front & center in both photos below. Mary Emma is middle row r and middle row l in the group photos below, respectively.

In 1945, Mom, Dad, and Galen moved back to our family farm near Kremlin, OK where they raised their three sons and lived for the remainder of their lives. We attended the North

Enid Mennonite Brethren Church until it closed in 1960 as it "merged" with the Enid "City" MB Church, then the Kremlin Community United Methodist Church. Rosa and David are buried in the North Enid MB cemetery.

(wife Virgie), Robert ("Bob" - "My wife says I'm such a sorry bastard! And she's right!"; wife Carol), Johnny (wife Mary Ann), & Dorothy (husband Eugene Gray)

Henry George - (married to Elsie Marie Schmidt); daughters are Gerry (husband Delmer Reimer) and Lorene (Rene; husband Jim Pauls)

Jacob Ben (married to Anna Helen Bergen); Richard "Dick" (wife Ruth Ann) is their only son

Peter Isaac (married to Thelma Malter); Curtis "Chip" (wife Rosa) is their only son

Anna Rosella ("Aunt Bush") - a school teacher who died relatively young (27) of cancer.

Arrel's Grandparents



Grandpa George (Gerhard) P Toews (4) was born 23 Nov 1874 in <u>Hierschau</u>, <u>Molotschna</u>, South Russia. He immigrated to the US with his family when only 4 years old. On 28 Jan 1897, he married Grandma Anna Buller in Hampton, NE; then on 18 Nov

1903, he & his family moved to Kremlin, OK in a boxcar. He passed from this world on 22 July 1940 (Arrel's birthday!).

Grandpa Jacob Albert Voth (6)
was born 27 March 1892 in
Henderson NE. On 1 June 1916,
he married Elisabeth A Schmidt
(7) in the North Enid MB Church.
They lived on the Voth home-place
(where Beverly Voth now lives) for
most all of their married life,
finally moving to Enid OK for their
later years. He died 26
September 1980 in Enid, OK.
Grandma Elisabeth Voth was born
29 March 1896 in Henderson NE,



and she died on 24 December 1972 in Enid OK.

Jacob A and Elizabeth are both buried in the

North Enid MB Cemetery. Their youngest
daughter, Tena M. (born 27 April 1926; died
5 January 1996) is buried in the same plot.














Arrel's Great-Grandparents

Note: All of our great-grandparents came to the US between 1874-79, all ending up near Henderson/Hampton NE, from where most eventually moved to the Kremlin/Enid OK area.

G-Grandpa Isaac Toews (8) was born 4 Feb 1844 in <u>Landskrone</u>, Molotschna, South Russia. He married Elisabeth Peters on 18 February 1872 in Landskrone. Isaac & his family, including my Grandpa George (Gerhard) P and his brother Isaak "Töws," immigrated to the United States in 1878 from <u>Hierschau</u>, Molotschna, bound for Sutton, NE. They left



Bremen, Germany on the Norddeutscher Lloyd Line's <u>S/S Strassburg</u>, arriving 2 July 1878 in NYC. The Isaac Toews family settled just S of Hampton NE and attended the Henderson MB Church. He died 16 Dec 1884 S of Hampton, NE, just 6 years after reaching the US - he is supposedly buried on a farm near Hampton NE (perhaps E/2-NW/4-4-10-5, Beaver Precinct, Hamilton Co NE); the Toews Brothers have searched this 80, but have not been able to locate any gravesite. We believe the photos below to be Isaac P and Elizabeth Peters Toews - the R panel includes a


notation by Gerry Toews Reimer identifying this couple as being Isaac P Toews and wife.



G-Grandma Elisabeth Peters (9) was born on 11 May 1852 in Landskrone, Molotschna, South Russia. After G-Grandpa Isaac Toews died in 1884, she rather quickly married Peter P Block, an immigrant from Kicin, Poland, on 3 May 1885. My dad, David A Toews, always called her "Grandma Block" (R). They lived first on Isaac's farm near Hampton NE (see 1888 Beaver Precinct plat map on p 76), then moved to Alsen/Munich ND in 1897 before moving again in 1911 to Kelstern, Saskatchewan, Canada. Kelstern is 475 mi due W of Winnipeg MB and 200 mi due N of Wolf Point MT.

<u>Elisabeth</u> died on 5 April 1937; she is buried in the <u>Elim MB Cemetery</u>, Moose Jaw, <u>Saskatchewan</u>, Canada. For more details and additional photos of the Elisabeth and Peter Block family, see the "<u>George P & Anna Toews Family</u>," available upon request.



Perhaps this is a good place to insert some additional information on the **9 siblings of our** *G-Grandfather Isaac Toews*. The photo collage below, painstakingly and meticulously documented and assembled by Myron Toews, shows the 10 children of *GG-G*randparents *Gerhard Isaac and Agatha Warkentine Toews* (for additional details, see p 32). Numbers indicate birth order, with 1 oldest and 10 youngest. Siblings 5, 6, 8, 9 & 10, as well as their father *Gerhard Isaac Toews*, all immigrated to the US in the 1870-80s.

Note the numerous interrelationships with other "non-Toews" members of our family tree. This is completely typical of our Mennonite ancestors. Since they sought to "live apart from the world," this effectively meant all living together - and intermarrying amongst themselves in the Molotschna, S Russia Colony.



A bit of information on **Isaak Toews' brother**, **Abraham** (both were sons of patriarch Gerhard Isaak Toews). Abraham was born on 5 June 1850 in Landskrone, Molotschna, S Russia. He married Maria Peters (born 1858) on 24 April 1879 in Landskrone, Molotschna, S Russia. They immigrated to the Henderson NE area, then moved to the Kremlin OK area. <u>Abraham</u> died 30 June 1918, and <u>Maria</u> in 1929 - they are both buried in the N Enid MB Cemetery.



The ca 1908 photo below shows the **Abraham Toews family** (right panel has information on individual family members).


2nd from L at back is Abraham "AA" Toews, father of William "Bill" Toews and grandfather of Dennis, Ellis, Eldon & Janice Toews. <u>Abraham A</u> and wife <u>Agnes S Benke Toews</u> are both buried in the N Enid MB Cemetery. AA's other son was <u>Abe Toews</u>, married to <u>Gladys E Thesman Toews</u>. <u>Bill</u> and his wife <u>Helena Janzen Toews</u> are also buried in the N Enid MB Cemetery. Gerhard (George; 3rd from L, back) married our Aunt Mary Neumann.

Dennis Toews tells of his G-Grandfather Abraham Toews sending his 20-year-old son Abraham A alone on horseback S from the Henderson NE area to search for a suitable family farm or farms. AA decided upon a farm SSW of Kremlin (SW/4-32-24N-6W) - see photos below. On US-81, 2.5 miles S of the Midway, it is an Oklahoma Centennial Farm.





Another son of patriarch Gerhard Isaac Toews was Gerhard Toews - he was a brother of



both Isaac and Abraham. Gerhard was born in Blumenort, Molotschna, S Russia - his first wife was Elizabeth Kroeker. They were married in 1859 and had 5 children, including Jacob J. Elizabeth died in S Russia before 1870. Gerhard then married Sara Wall in 1870 and



Gerhard owned several farms in Beaver Township, Hamilton County

NE. Gerhard is the G-Grandfather of John Raymond Quiring, a Tabor College classmate of

mine, currently living on a farm near Hampton, Hamilton County NE. The ancestral line for John R Quiring follows.

Jacob J Toews - Jacob J and Katharina Ediger Toews are John's G-Grandparents.

Photos below show John R and Helen Wiebe Quiring with Arrel & Kathy Toews during our visit to their farm near Hampton, Hamilton County NE on 25 September 2019 (r), and John and Arrel at Gerhard Isaac Toews' gravestone in the Henderson MB Church Cemetery near Henderson NE (l). John is an excellent historian, guide, and valuable fount of information with respect to our shared ancestors and heritage in NE. The Beaver Valley Cemetery, where Kathy's GG-Grandfather Gottfried (Gottlieb) Ferdinand Fadenrecht is buried, is located on his farm. He creatively and lovingly maintains the Henderson MB Cemetery note the clump of tall bluestem beside Gerhard Isaac's grave at I below. The Henderson/Hamilton County NE area was also the primary initial immigration site from S Russia in the 1870s for the Voth, Schmidt, and Fadenrecht families of Kathy's and my ancestral lines and John is equally knowledgeable about them as well.

John R Quiring and Arrel D Toews are 3rd cousins once removed in the Toews family line, and not unexpectedly, also 4th cousins once removed on the Voth side of my family - our common ancestor in that line is Cornelius Cornelius Quiring.

In addition to Gerhard's son Jacob J (John Quiring line), another son was <u>Abraham G "AG" Toews</u>, paterfamilias of a large NEMB Church family, most all of whom we knew well. AG was a first cousin to our Gpa George P Toews. AG married <u>Susana Regier</u> in 1912, and later <u>Elizabeth Goertzen</u> in 1960. After moving from the Henderson NE area, AGs lived just W of NEMB Church, later also homeplace of son Joel and wife Anna Lula (photo below R). His children were Anna Ella, who went by <u>Ella</u> (husband <u>Frank Wiens</u>), George A <u>"Georgie"</u> (wife <u>Mabel</u> Wiebe), John <u>"Johnny R"</u> (wife <u>Sarah</u> Wiebe, sister to George's wife Mabel), Sarah Sophia "Sophie" (husband <u>Ruben Thesman</u>), <u>Joel</u> (wife <u>Anna Lula</u> Voth) and <u>Calvin</u> (wife <u>Bertha Ann</u> Thesman); Ruben, Anna Lula and Bertha Ann were all cousins of our mother Rosa.

G-Grandpa Heinrich J. Buller (10) was born 9 Dec 1850 and G-Grandma Sara Buller Buller (11) on 25 Nov 1845, both in Alexanderwohl, Molotschna, S Russia. They married on 30 Nov 1872 in Alexanderwohl. In 1874, led by Elder Jakob Buller, most of the Alexanderwohl colony immigrated en masse to the current Alexanderwohl community near Goessel, Marion County KS. The Alexanderwohl colony was so named because of a solicitous chance encounter with Tsar Alexander I by a group of Prussian Mennonites migrating from W Prussia to S. Russia in 1821 - he stopped and visited with them, then "wished them well" - hence the name Alexanderwohl!

Originating in the Flanders (Flemish) Province of Belgium in the 16th century, this Mennonite community (Old Flemish Mennonite Society of Groningen) moved to the region of the Vistula-Nogat River Delta of West Prussia (near Danzig - now Gdańsk, Poland) in the 17th century (1600-1650). They were promised religious freedom and welcomed because of their farming abilities - they drained marshes, built prosperous farms, planted orchards, and established roads and canals; their Holland windmills beautified the countryside. Their success was viewed with envy by native West Prussians, and when strong militaristic trends began to develop, they sought a new home, migrating from Przekhovka, Swetz area near Marienwerder, W Prussia to the Molotschna Colony in S Russia, again seeking freedom from religious intolerance and persecution. Establishing their new village of Alexanderwohl in 1821 as part of the Molotschna Colony, they were again very prosperous in their farming and associated endeavors for over 50 years; however, they then again felt led to leave their comfortable existence in S Russia when a 100-year-old immunity from established religious orthodoxy and mandatory military service, established by Empress Catherine The Great (Ekaterina II), was being threatened by Tsar Alexander II. These same factors were responsible for the migration of many other Mennonites from S Russia to the US, including all of my ancestors.

On 31 July 1874, 303 adults and 172 children, led by Elder Jacob Buller, boarded the

Hamburg America Line's <u>S/S Cimbria</u>, from Hamburg/Harve, landing in New York harbor on 27 August 1874. This included *G-Gparents Heinrich & Sara Buller Buller*. The colonists accepted an offer to purchase 100,000 acres of land from the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad about 12 miles NNE of Newton, KS, near the current town of Goessel, and established their new "Neu" Alexanderwohl Colony there.



The photos below are of the current Alexanderwohl Mennonite Church near Goessel, KS. The Mennonite Heritage and Agricultural Museum in nearby Goessel, KS is well worth a visit, as is the Kauffman Museum with its tallgrass prairie reconstruction in Newton, KS, across from the Bethel College campus. Both are rich in Mennonite memorabilia and information.



Arrel Toews - My Ancestors





Heinrich (Henry) Buller and his wife Sara lived on 2 different farms in the Alexanderwohl Colony near Goessel KS, moving to Hamilton County, NE in 1888, where our Toews grandparents met and eventually married (their families lived close to each other), then to near Kremlin, OK in 1902, where they lived in a "shack" on our "40" (SW/4-NW/4-21-24N-6W). Sara died on 25 Feb 1928 in her home near Kremlin OK. Heinrich Buller died on 15 January 1937 in the guest bedroom of our family farmhouse, where my Dad found him hanging from a window sashcord. Henry and Sara are both buried in the North Enid Mennonite Brethren cemetery. Their six children: Anna (my Grandma Toews), Henry (1878), Peter A (1879; James Buller's GPa), Sara O (1880), John W (1882) & Jacob (1886).







ALEXANDERWOHL VILLAGES IN KANSAS, 1874

The 1885 Lehigh Twp Marion County KS Plat Map below shows the two farms Heinrich and Sara Buller owned in the Alexanderwohl Colony, first in Section 27 (A), then in Section 11 (B). The Alexanderwohl MB Church is denoted in red at the bottom of this map. The farm of another Heinrich Buller in Section 19 is denoted with a purple dashed box.



Photos below show farms in the Alexanderwohl, Molotschna, S Russia area as they appeared during our 2008 Mennonite Heritage Tour (top panels) and Heinrich Buller's Alexanderwohl, Marion County KS farms (bottom panels; L first farm A, R second farm B; see map on previous page). My brother Myron Toews in lower photos - taken by his son Alex Toews. Having visited both locations, it is easy to imagine why the Alexanderwohl Colony chose the Goessel KS area for their new home.

G-Grandpa Jacob J Voth (12) was born 18 Mar 1870 in Kleefeld, Molotschna, South Russia. He immigrated to the Henderson NE area with his parents and siblings in 1879. G-Grandma Anna J. Toews (13) was born 12 May 1871 in Landskrone, Molotschna. She was an orphan and she and her brother Cornelius C immigrated with friends and came to Henderson NE in the 1870s, where she was taken in by the Peter Abrahams family as maid and foster daughter. Jacob J married Anna Toews on 9 October 1890 in Henderson NE. This family moved to Kremlin OK in 1901.

Jacob J died 15 Jun 1938 and Anna J 28 Mar 1943, both near Kremlin OK. <u>Jacob J</u> and <u>Anna J</u> are both buried in the <u>North Enid MB</u> <u>Cemetery</u>.










G-Grandpa Abraham A. Schmidt (14) was born 25 Jul 1850 in Schardau, Molotschna,



South Russia. He immigrated to the United States from the Kuban Oblast of S Russia (on the Black Sea E of the Crimean Peninsula) on the Norddeutscher Lloyd Line's SS. Main (Mein; Bremen, Germany to NYC), arriving at age 26 in June 1876, and settled in York Co, NE (near Henderson). He married Katharina Nickel in 1877, but she died in 1880. He then married

Katharina Johann Regier (15) on 22 Nov 1880 in Henderson, NE. She was born 19 October 1861 in Hierschau, Molotschna, but soon moved to the village of Klippenfeld, Molotschna with her parents. Katharina came to the US in 1879 with her family on the same ship voyage as GG-GPa & GG-GMa Jacob & Anna Voth (see below). The Abraham A & Katharina

Schmidt family later moved from York County, NE to near Enid, OK (on US-81 & the Old North Enid MB Church road, diagonally across from the Chisholm Trail Marker) in June 1900, but ~1918, they moved to the Reedley/Dinuba area, eventually finding home at 1151 M St, Reedley, CA.

Katharina left this world on 4 September 1922 and Abraham on 10 October 1928, both in Reedley, CA, where








Relationships of our Great-Grandparents

The very useful annotated map of the Molotschna Colony below, prepared by Myron Toews, shows the relationships among our four sets of Great-Grandparents. Birthplaces are shown in regular font, marriage sites in italics, with various families color-coded.



Isaac Toews and Elizabeth Peters were married in Landskrone, their shared village. Henry J Buller and Sara Buller were married in Alexanderwohl, their shared village, both villages in the Molotschna Colony of S Russia. Jacob J Voth was from Kleefeld and Anna Toews from Landskrone - they married in Henderson NE, where they were neighbors. Abraham Schmidt (Schardau) and Katharina Regier (Heirschau) grew up further apart in separate villages in the Molotschna Colony but were married in Henderson NE, where they were neighbors. Our Great-Grandma Anna Voth was a Toews, and she came from the same village as our other Toews ancestors (Landskrone).

The map of Beaver Township, Hamilton County NE on p 42 shows the location and proximity of our ancestor's farms in NE.


Arrel's Great-Great-GrandParents

I am including some information on my Toews, Buller, Voth, and Schmidt *GG-Grandparents*, as well as others, but I do not have family photos or photos of gravestones for all of them. Those interested may wish to consult the "*Arrel Toews Ahnentafel*" (ask for it) for ancestors tracing back to the *early 1600s in Polish (W) Prussia and 1582 in Switzerland!*

GG-Grandpa Gerhard Isaac Toews (16) is the oldest of my Toews ancestors buried in the US. Born 28 September 1809 in 5 Russia, the 1835 Molotschna census lists him at Blumenort #25, home of his step-father, Abraham Abraham Konrad. He married Agatha



Warkentin (17) around 1829 and they moved to the Molotschna village of <u>Landskrone</u> in 1839. They had a prosperous "wirtschaft" outside the "dorf" of <u>Landskrone</u>, with a large white stone house. Photo at L taken in S Russia.



They left Bremen (Antwerp?) bound to the US aboard

the Red Star Line's <u>S.S. Nederland</u>, with son Abraham, but Agatha died at sea, just prior to the ship's arrival in New York Harbor on 12 August 1882. As governmental immigrant regulations required immediate departure for the Henderson NE area, Gerhard Isaac was compelled to hire complete strangers to make burial arrangements for his beloved wife, and neither he nor any of his descendants have any knowledge of her burial place, date, or

ceremony of interment.

Gerhard Isaac's father, GGG-Grandpa Isaac Toews was born ~1765 in Royal (Polish; soon to be West) Prussia, most likely in the village of <u>Blumenort</u>, and his mother, GGG-Grandma Catharina Woelck Toews in <u>Hochzeit</u>, Danzig, West Prussia on 3 July 1783. They were married in 1805 and are listed in the 1808 Blumenort, Molotschna, S Russia census. GG-Grandpa Gerhard Isaac was born to them in 1809. Isaac died sometime before 1813 in Blumenort, Molotschna, S Russia; Catharina also died in Blumenort, Molotschna, date unknown. Arrel's "Toews Family" line going back ends with this GGG-Grandpa Isaac Toews.

GG-Grandfather Johann Aron Peters (18) was born 5 April 1809 in Landskrone, Molotschna S Russia, and he died ~2 April 1890 in Hampton NE. On 11 September 1832, he married GG-Grandmother Margaretha Loewen (19), born 23 February 1814 in Prussia. He purchased NE/4-12 of Beaver Precinct, Hamilton County NE for \$1200 - this farm is just N of the farm of Abraham Schmidt and $\frac{1}{2}$ mile N of the original Henderson MB Church and Cemetery. Johann and Margaretha Loewen Peters are the parents of G-Grandmother Elizabeth Peters Toews Block. GGG-Grandpa Aron Johann Peters, Johann Aron's father, born ~1781, came from Prussia to S Russia in 1809, settling at #9 Ruchenau, Molotschna.

GG-Grandfather Jacob Jacob Buller (20) was born 12 Aug 1796 in Przechowka, Schwetz, Prussia. He later migrated to S Russia and lived in the village of Alexanderwohl, Molotschna. In the 1835 census, he is listed at Alexanderwohl #15, and is said to have come from Franzthal, Molotschna in 1822. The entry for Franzthal #5 says he moved away from there in 1822. He married Helena Toews on 1 December 1835. He was previously married to Aganetha Reimer. GG-Grandmother Helena Toews (21) was born 23 December 1817 in Fischau, Molotschna. Their son, our G-Grandpa Heinrich J. Buller was born to them on 9 Dec 1850 in Alexanderwohl, Molotschna. Jacob Jacob died 11 September 1869 and Helena Toews Buller on 29 June 1887, presumably both in Molotschna, S Russia.

Jacob Jacob's parents (Arrel's Buller GGG-Grandparents) were (of course!) Jacob Buller, born 4 Sept 1731 in Deutsch Konopat, Schwetz, Prussia, and Elscke Wedels, born 2 April 1757 in Glugowko, Schwetz, Prussia. They were married 2 March 1783 in Przechowka, Schwetz, Prussia. Elscke died on 13 October 1809 in Przechowka, Schwetz, Prussia and Jacob on 10 June 1836 in Alexanderwohl, Molotschna, S Russia.

Parents of G-Grandmother Sara Buller Buller were GG-Grandfather Heinrich Buller (22), born 18 April 1814 in Deutsch Konopat, Schwetz, Prussia, died 1857, and GG-Grandmother Anna Schmidt (23), born 21 July 1819 in Glugowko, Schwetz, Prussia, died 28 December 1896. They married 18 November 1839, presumably in Alexanderwohl, Molotschna, S Russia, where daughter Sara was born in 1845.

In case anyone is not yet confused, Arrel has 2 GG-Grandfather Bullers!

The known line of our Buller family ends with GGGGGGG-Grandfather Heinrich Buller, born ~1580 in Bruetisellen, Zurich, Switzerland. Heinrich died sometime after 1615 in Deutsch Konopat, Schwetz, Prussia.

GG-Grandpa Jacob Voth (24) was born 22 August 1837 in Kleefeld, Molotschna, 5 Russia, one of three sons of GGG-Grandpa Heinrich "Henry" Voth (2 daughters also).

At age 16, Jakob drove a four-horse bread wagon in the Crimean War (1853-1856). The four horses were killed, but he played dead and survived. He never saw his two brothers again (aged 19 and 20 at the time) and they were presumed killed in the war. Anna Neufeld (25) was born 2 April 1844 in Liebenau, Molotschna. At age 11, she is listed as a student at Lichtfelde School, Molotschna. On 8 November 1863, Jakob and Anna were married in S Russia - their presumptive wedding photo is shown at R [Note: perhaps this is Jacob J & Anna J Voth wedding photo instead]. Anna taught her husband to read and write, and he in turn taught children to read at their farmhouse, using the Bible as a textbook.



Their family, including Jacob (41), Anna (35), and sons

Heinrich (12), G-Grandpa Jacob J (9), Gerhard (7), Abraham (4) and Peter (1) came to the

US from Kleefeld, Molotschna via Antwerp, Belgium aboard the Red Star Line's <u>S. S.</u>

<u>Switzerland</u>, arriving in Philadelphia 24 June 1879. Their destination was the Hamilton



S.S. SWITZERLAND, 1874 Red Star-American Line

County NE area where they arrived 4 July 1879 and lived near Beaver (between Henderson & Hampton) NE, attending the Henderson MB Church. Their first home was a sod house with sundried mud bricks used for the fireplace and beds made of barrelstave hammocks with straw-tick

mattresses. They later moved to near Kremlin OK in 1901, where they farmed; Jacob also served as Sunday School Superintendent at the N Enid MB Church.

The Jacob and Anna Voth family are shown below in a photo believed taken in the Hamilton County NE area about 1892 - children shown are, in order of increasing age, Katherine "Tina" (6), Johann "John" (12), Peter (14), Abraham (18), Gerhard "George" (20). G-Grandpa Jacob J (22) and brother Henry (25) were both already married by 1892, probably explaining their absence from this photo.



Note that G-Grandma Katharina Johann Regier Schmidt came to the US with her family, father Johann (40), mother Maria (31), Katharina (17), sisters Anna (14) and Elisabeth (10), and brother Johann (0), on the same voyage of the S.S. Switzerland in 1879 as the Jacob and Anna Neufeld Voth family above.

Jacob died 8 Jan 1902 near Enid OK and <u>Anna</u> on 7
September 1924 in Hillsboro KS. They are buried together in the <u>North Enid MB cemetery</u> & birth and death dates are taken from their gravestone. They are the oldest of our Voth ancestors buried in the US. "Blessed are the dead, that die in the Lord."

The photo below shows **GG-Grandma Anna Neufeld Voth** and her children, presumably after the death of her husband Jacob Voth in 1902. They are, back, L/R: Peter, Abe, Katharina (Tina), **G-Grandpa Jacob J**; front: Henry, **GG-Grandma Anna**, George, John.

"Brethren and friends, here is the sad news, that God has decided to call to her Heavenly glory our mother and grandmother, Anna Voth, born Neufeld. She was born April 14, 1844, and went to her Father on September 7, 1924, at 9 in the morning. The burial, God willing, will take place Friday September 12 at 2 in the afternoon at the M.B. Church at Enid, Oklahoma, to which everyone is welcome (invited). [Signed by] Those Left Behind"

A few brief notes on the children of GG-Grandparents Jacob and Anna Neufeld Voth:



At left, Jacob J & Anna J Voth (G-Grandparents) family in OK in 1903: back, Anna E, Anna J, Grandpa Jacob A; front, Jacob J, Peter H, Cornelius J (Chris). They lived and farmed on the (later) Jacob A Voth homeplace. Similar photo bottom p 24.

Tina (Katharina) Voth married Peter H Berg, grandfather to Al Berg and Karen Berg Neufeld. Al and Karen are our 2nd cousins, once removed. PH taught school in Kremlin in 1909 and was editor of the MB Publishing House in Hillsboro KS from 1922-57.

George Voth lived near Kremlin OK - he was a long-time pastor of the N Enid MB Church. Father of John Voth, grandfather of Fritz Voth.

Henry Voth moved straight to OR from NE, several years before any other siblings left NE. He had a prune plum orchard.

Peter Voth had a general store in Kremlin OK and later owned Voth Grocery in Dallas OR.

Abe Voth was Kate Turell's father, and they later moved from Kremlin to near Dallas OR.

John Voth also moved to OR, where he was presumably a farmer.

In OR, all of the Voth Brothers lived in the Salt Creek community near Dallas OR.

GG-Grandpa Jacob Voth's sons ran the Voth Brothers "Huber" Threshing Crew in the Kremlin area - <u>Abraham J</u> was engineer, <u>Gerhard "George"</u> on the separator, <u>Johann "John" H</u> on the water wagon ("Water Monkey"), my G-Gpa <u>Jacob J</u> on the bundle wagon, <u>Peter J</u> on the coal wagon, shoveling coal into the engine, and daughter <u>Katie C "Tina" (nee Berg)</u> in the cook-shack; <u>Katherine E "Kate" Voth Turrell</u>, Abraham's daughter, assisted with the cooking.

Photos of the "Voth Brothers" threshing crew are shown below (1903) - the 5 sons of Jacob Voth are identified in the lower photo: Kate Turell, daughter of son Abraham J and grand-daughter of Jacob Voth, says they sold their threshing equipment in 1906 in order to buy a store in Kremlin.

NW/4-29-24N-6W is diagonally SE from the JAV homeplace, directly across US-81. The photo at right is either Menno or Rosa Voth and a hired man (or perhaps Peter H Voth) with shocks of wheat - years after the other photos.

Not much specific information is known about *GGG-G*randparents Voth: Heinrich Jacob Voth was born in 1799, location unknown. About 1820, he married Eva Funk (born about 1806, location unknown) in S Russia. The 1835 Molotschna Census lists him at Mariental #18, home of Franz Johann Voth (perhaps a relative). They had three sons, including our *GG-G*randfather Jacob Voth, and two daughters. Heinrich worked as a yardman in a

brickyard in "Rurend Wide" S
Russia. He died in 1846 and Eva in
1847, both in S Russia. Photo at R
shows Heinrich and Eva Funk Voth
in S Russia, date unknown. Photo
provided by Debbie Thesman
Wright, daughter of Mose and
Leora Thesman and granddaughter
of "Uncle Jake and Aunt Anna"

Heinrich's father was, of course, another Jacob Voth (only the name is known).

This GGGG-Grandfather Jacob Voth is the oldest documented Voth relative of Arrel.

GG-Grandfather Cornelius Toews (26) was born about 1846 in Landskrone, Molotschna S Russia and he died before 1882. He married GG-Grandmother Anna Schmidt (27), date unknown, and she died in 1874 in S Russia. They are the parents of G-Grandmother Anna Toews Voth (Mrs Jacob J Voth). Cornelius Toews was a son (9th child) of our GG-Grandfather Gerhard Isaac Toews (see p 46). He and Anna stayed in S Russia.

GG-Grandfather Heinrich Schmidt (28) was born in 1793 in Germany. GG-Grandmother Katherine Funk (29) was born 22 June 1807 in Prussia. Heinrich died in 1863 in Schardau, Molotschna, S Russia. Katherine Funk Schmidt is listed at Schardau #11 in the 1858

Census, and as a widow in the Kuban Intent Document of 1864. She died February 1874 in Kuban Colony, S Russia. Kuban Colony was a S Russia Mennonite settlement in the N Caucasus on the Kuban River E of the Sea of Azov and NE of the Black Sea (see map at R). This Heinrich Schmidt is the end of Arrel's known Schmidt family line.



GG-Grandfather Johann Regier (30) was born 22 March 1839 and died 8 July 1902.

GG-Grandmother Katharina Franz Regier (31) was born 18 January 1818 and died 2

February 1875; locations all unknown. They are parents of G-Grandmother Katharina Regier Schmidt.

Not in the direct Toews branch of our family tree, but there is an interesting *Cornelius Cornelius Toews* among our ancestors at the *GGGG-Grandparents* level, born 4 Oct 1766 in Ladekopperfeld, Prussia. He migrated from Tiegenhagen, Prussia to Lindenau, Molotschna, 5 Russia prior to 1808 and died in Lindenau on 14 Sep 1831. This Cornelius Toews family was one of the founding families of the <u>Kleine Gemeinde</u> ("Little Church;" see GAMEO link for details); all of their children were involved in the movement, and son Johan Toews was one of the first young people baptized into the KG in 1814. They contrasted with the remaining Molotschna Mennonites, "die Grosse Gemeinde" (Big Church). Among the practices they especially condemned were card-playing, smoking, drinking, higher education, musical instruments, mission work, and marrying one's sister-in-law! Obviously, a challenging lifestyle to follow. This splinter group later became organized in Canada as the Evangelical Mennonite Church, while the NE colony was assimilated into the Krimmer MB Church.

Arrel's earliest documented ancestors

Arrel's earliest documented ancestors include a Heinrich Buller (b ~1580, Breutisellen, Zurich, Switzerland), a Hans Ratzlaff (b 1630), a Voht (b 1586), a Voth (b 1611; Culm, Prussia), an Andreas Pancratz (b 1625, Culm, Prussia) and an Ehrenst Schmidt (b 1636; Deutsch Konopat, Schwetz, Prussia). These are mostly 9th G-Grandparents!



Note: Myron Toews has digitized and edited the "Genealogical Record of Descendants of Gerhard Isaac Toews" notebook assembled by Anna T Wiens in the early 1970s. It is a valuable resource for genealogical research regarding our extended family. A .pdf version is available from Myron Toews upon request. I have Galen's actual copy.

Many of our ancestors immigrated from S Russia to Beaver Precinct, Hamilton County NE in the 1870s. An 1888 Plat Map, annotated by Myron Toews, is shown below. The A Sperling denoted as "Bill Buller's Mother" below is the same man from whom George P Toews purchased our homeplace in Kremlin Twp, OK Territory in 1903 (see "George P and Anna Toews Family" on this website for details).

Town 10 North Range 5 West of the 6th Principal Meridian. Hamilton County, Nebraska 1888 Plat Map




Molotschna, S Russia Villages of Our Ancestors

In 2008, Kathy and I were fortunate to be able to accompany Galen and Anita, first for a week in St. Petersburg, Russia, then on to the Ukraine (formerly S Russia) to visit the sites of the villages from which our ancestors immigrated, as part of the Mennonite Heritage Cruise and Tour. We spent 4 days docked in Zaporozhe, with one full day of touring the North Molotschna colonies - not much remains, but we were able to find all the villages and also some structural remnants, even enough for some souvenirs (including dirt!). A very brief overview and collection of photos, mostly from that trip, are included below.

Landskrone was established in 1839 along the Begin-Tschokrak River and planned according to the requirement of Johann Cornies and the Agricultural Society, with 40 families coming from other Molotschna villages. Houses and the Mennonite church were constructed mostly of red clay bricks, leading to its informal name of the "red village." By 1869, there was a 3-room schoolhouse, over 5,500 fruit trees, 36 full farms, 8 half-farms, and 34 small farms, occupying 3,144 dessiatines (8,489 acres). The retreating German Army destroyed the village in 1943 and today nothing remains save some rubble from the church building (see floor tiles below, far R).

Landskrone was the home village of GG-Grandparents Gerhard Isaac and Agatha
Warkentine Toews prior to immigrating to the US and also the birthplace of both
G-Grandparents, Isaac and Elisabeth Peters Toews. Arches photos are from Hierschau.









Alexanderwohl was the home village of G-Grandparents Heinrich J and Sara Buller Buller - see their entry above for more information. Additional photos are shown below. The village school building, below center, is still in use today.







The panel below shows what remained of the Molotschna Alexanderwohl Mennonite Church when Galen, Anita, Kathy & I visited the Ukraine in 2008 as part of our Mennonite Heritage Cruise. The B/W photo shows the church as it appeared in 1890.



<u>Hierschau</u> was founded in 1848 with families from other Molotschna villages - it was designed and constructed on the left bank of the Begim-Tschokrak River as a "model village," (name means "look here") under rigid specifications set by Ohrloff Agricultural Society head, <u>Johann Cornies</u> (see the book "Hierschau: An Example of Russian Mennonite Life" by Heubert). The houses were all made of burned tile. Besides the very productive soil, Hierschau also owned clay pits and tile/brickyards, which contributed to the prosperity of the village. Plantings of fruit trees surrounded the regularly spaced farm buildings and yielded a considerable annual income, while the opposite side of the village had gardens and a grove of trees. Only a Mennonite gatepost still stands (see previous page).

Grandpa George (Gerhard) P Toews was born in Hierschau, and it was the home village from which he and his parents, our G-Grandparents Isaac and Elisabeth Peters Toews, left when they immigrated to the US in 1878. There never was a church in Hierschau. The photos below show farmsteads where Hierschau was formerly located.





Liebenau (GG-Grandmother Anna Neufeld Voth) was founded in 1823 on the 5 bank of the Tokmak River - It has quite a bit of preserved Mennonite buildings and brick/tile gateposts and fences (see below). The name means "lovely meadow." A number of well-preserved houses have the hip-roofs introduced by Johann Cornies. Villagers suffered considerably during the Russian Revolution and Civil War, with several men shot by Nestor Makhno's anarchist bandits.











We did not visit the south Molotschna villages of **Kleefeld** (1854; no trace remains - birthplace of *GG-G*randpa Jacob and *G-G*randpa Jacob J Voth) nor **Schardau** (1820; again, almost nothing remains), birthplace of *G-G*randpa Abraham A Schmidt).

A final note from our Molotschna tour in 2008: The first stop of our North Molotschna tour was the village of Fuerstenau, and Alan Peters, our guide, noted that there had been a clay pit and tile/brick yard to the north. At the next stop, Schoenesee, we viewed church ruins (the church has since been restored) and Alan Peters noted there were terra cotta roof tiles for the taking - for anyone foolish enough to lug them around in their luggage for 2 weeks! Of course Galen and I immediately headed for the tile pile, along with a single other tourist, an Enns from Canada. Scavenging through the tiles, we managed to find some with imprints on the back. With my rudimentary Russian knowledge, I managed to translate Fabrickerweise (village N of Fuerstenau) and "& Enns" but was stuck on the first word in the lower line until Alan Peters said "That's Toews! Toews and Enns!" Perhaps the most golden moment of our tour for me! I can help with the translations if anyone cares!





The other note concerns Fuerstenau, the first village on our North Molotschna tour - The

central portion of a former Mennonite estate house is now used as a village "social club" or meeting house - the remaining portions of the house were scavenged during the formation of "collective farms" mandated by Josef Stalin following the Russian Revolution. The Neufelds were the owners of that former Mennonite estate house - so shown at right is Kathy Neufeld Toews in front of her "Klub Neufeld!"



Family Names

(web-links are mostly to GAMEO)

Toews: The family name Toews and its many permutations (including Töws) was a common family name among W Prussian Mennonites. The name is probably of Dutch origin, derived from Matthew (Mattheus), but it spent some early time in Germany as well. Variants of Mattheus are found repeatedly in earliest days of Anabaptism, including amongst the list of martyrs (Matthijss; 1564). Toews/Toeffs/Taews and other variants were found in Tiegenhagen, Ladekopp, Rosenort, Fürstenwerder, Heubuden, Elbing, and Danzig communities of W Prussia after 1530, when they began fleeing Holland and nearby countries. According to some genealogists, the original Dutch name was "van Toovs" that, when the family sought refuge in Germany, became "Töws" and later, without the umlaut, "Toews." Arrel's Great-Grandpa Isaac Toews and his family, including Grandpa Gerhard P, are listed as "Töws" on their immigrant ship manifest in 1878.

For a somewhat less charitable, not to mention less applicable, take on the origin of our family name, check out the houseofnames.com entry: "The name Toews can be traced to the ancient Celtic culture of Wales. The surname Toews is derived from the Welsh word "Tew," which means portly or plump and was most likely the nickname for a heavy-set person." OK, well. Another source says Toews means a descendent of Matthew (The Gift of God) - now that's more like it!

Buller: The relevant Buller surname may be of early medieval German origin, from the Middle High German "bullen", "to roar," which was a nickname for a man with a loud voice. This surname first appears in the Church Registers of early German States in the 16th Century. Buller (Büller) was a Mennonite family name in the Old Flemish congregations in Werussia, first mentioned at Schönsee (Sosnovka) in 1695. All members of this family immigrated to Russia (Molotschna settlement) in the first third of the 19th century, and subsequently to Kansas and Nebraska, from where they have spread into other states.

Jacob Buller, elder of the Alexanderwohl congregation in S Russia and later at Goessel, Kansas, was one of the 12 delegates sent to America in 1873 to prepare for the migration.

<u>Voth</u>: The family name Voth is probably of North German origin, from the Middle Low German "vot" or "foot." Hence, it was most probably a nickname for someone with some peculiarity or deformity of the foot, but perhaps also a topographic name for someone who lived at the foot of a hill. We will hope for the latter possibility! Voth (and its variations, including Vogt, Voet, Fogt, and yes, Foot!) is a Mennonite family name commonly found among the descendants of the Prussian and S Russian Mennonites. It was found in W Prussia as early as 1630 and in Danzig by 1677. Mainly it is found in congregational records from

<u>Montau-Gruppe</u>, <u>Schönsee</u>, Jeziorka, <u>Tragheimerweide</u>, and Danzig, W Prussia. It is not clear whether the Prussian Voth-Foth family descended from a Dutch-Flemish Voogt family, or from a Swiss Vogt family. It is doubtful that Vogt was a family name found among the early Swiss <u>Anabaptists</u>, though Hans Vogt, of Villingen, canton of <u>Aargau</u>, did attend the third Anabaptist disputation at Bern.

<u>Schmidt</u>: Schmidt is a common German occupational surname derived from the German word "Schmied" meaning "blacksmith" and/or "metalworker". This surname is the German equivalent of "Smith" in the English-speaking world. Schmidt is a common Mennonite name, particularly among those of Prussian and S Russian background. The name appears in the early <u>church records</u> of <u>Thiensdorf</u>, Orlofferfelde, <u>Danzig</u>, <u>Elbing</u>, <u>Jeziorka</u>, <u>Przechovka</u>, <u>Konopat</u> and <u>Kazun</u> communities of W Prussia. The first records of the name in Prussia date back as early as 1586.


