George (Gerhard) P and Anna Buller Toews

Arrel's Grandpa Gerhard P Toews was born 23 Nov 1874 in <u>Hierschau</u>, <u>Molotschna</u>, South Russia, and he immigrated to the US with his family when only 4 years old. He remembered

nothing at all about this journey because when his father Isaac died several years later, George had very high fever from Influenza, and he had no memories from before that illness. He was baptized in Beaver Creek, S of Hampton NE in August 1889. On 28 Jan 1897, he married Grandma Anna Buller in Hampton NE. Their first home was near Hampton NE (photo p 3). On 18 Nov 1903, at age 29, he and his family moved to Kremlin OK in a railroad boxcar, plus a cattle car for



the horses, wagon, walking plow, furniture, and a cow or two. He passed from this world on 22 July 1940 (Arrel's birthday!) at age 65. *Grandma Anna Buller Toews* was born on 5 April 1875 in Marion County KS, and she died near Kremlin OK on 25 November 1947 at age 72. <u>George P</u> and <u>Anna</u> are both buried in the <u>North Enid Mennonite Brethren cemetery</u>.

They had 6 children (birth order): Clara (Clada), Henry (Heinie), Peter (Pud), Jacob (Cub), Anna (Aunt Bush), & David (Squirrel) - yes, everyone had nicknames!




Photo below is the first home of George P and Anna Buller Toews, near Hampton NE. Caption written by my grandfather, George P Toews is below the photo. We presume, but cannot be sure, that this was the house on the farm owned by G-Grandfather Isaac Toews, very near Hampton NE ($E^{1}/_{2}$ -NW/4-4-10N-5W). We also presume George P and Anna are shown in the photo with daughter Clara – later Mrs. Pete Voth. Perhaps it was taken on a return visit after moving to Kremlin OK in 1903. Clara was only 18 months of age when they moved to OK. From


George P Toews purchased 260 acres of land just W of Kremlin OK in 1903 - see 1906 Kremlin Township plat map below. This land included "Uncle Henry's farm" (NW/4-21-24N-6W), purchased for \$2900 on 8 January 1903, 40 acres of which were soon sold for \$725 to his father-in-law (our G-Grandfather) Heinrich Buller, who moved a small house onto it from Kremlin. This farm was purchased almost a year before the family moved to Kremlin.

On 26 December 1903, about a month after arriving from NE, George P also purchased for \$1800 the E 100 acres of the adjacent farm, NE/4-20-24N-6W - this would become his and eventually also our homeplace. "Old Man" Abraham Sperling, who also owned the farm just S of this one, retained the W 60 acres, and George P purchased this remaining land on 12 October 1910 for \$2500, thus gaining ownership of the entire 160 acre farm. This farm has been in our family ever since. Myron Toews can supply detailed information on various specific land transactions for Toews family farms, not to mention some legal shenanigans associated with our homeplace! George P Toews family was good friends with Jacob J Voths (our G-Grandparents; * on map below; purchased 4 April 1901), perhaps at least partially explaining the proximity of their farms. This Abraham Sperling is the same man who owned the E/2-SE/4-17-10N-5W in

Beaver Precinct, Hamilton County NE (see 1888 plat map on p 74 of "Ancestors of Arrel Toews."

Some historical information on our family homeplace - it was part of the territory of the <u>Cherokee Outlet</u> <u>Opening</u> (Land Run of 1893), the largest of four land runs in then OK Territory. Our farm was homesteaded by John W Rockenbach (Rockenbeck on 1901 plat map), a single man who filed his claim on 22 June 1900 and was granted title on 12 October 1900.

On 4 September 1902, he sold the entire farm to Abraham Sperling for \$3500. This land was part of OK Territory at this time, with OK not gaining statehood until 1907.



unknown or puzzling about this house, but presumably it was on the George P/David A Toews homeplace. No living persons have any memories of it. Caption from back of photo (L) firmly establishes it as the George P Toews home. Perhaps row of six trees are the elms that bordered our garden patch in later years?



Shown below at R is perhaps the same house as above, soon after it was constructed (ca 1904) -George P and Anna Buller Toews arrived at their new farm at Kremlin OK with daughter Clara (b 1902) and adopted daughter Mary Neuman (b 1895) on 18 November 1903. The terrain seems flatter R of the house in the photo below relative to the above photo. photo from Mike Gray, son of Dorothy Voth Gray, grandson of <u>Clara Toews</u> Voth.

Our father, David A Toews, recalled: "Rockenbach homesteaded this farm and as far as I remember, he was a bachelor that lived in a **dugout** and probably wanted to get rid of what he had left, because he only had a hundred acres. Old Man Sperling had the west 60."

Then "they built the original house."



Photo below is of the George P and Anna Toews homeplace 1.5 miles W of Kremlin OK; also the homeplace of David A and Rosa M Toews, our parents, and their three sons, Galen, Arrel & Myron. (ca 1920-30) Note the haystack behind the house, summer kitchen/wash house, windmill, garage, and second auto at extreme R. David Toews says his earliest memory is of the porch being built in 1921, when he was 5, so perhaps this second house was built in early 1920s.



PREFACE

This Catechism was first published at Elbing, Prussia, in 1783. It was republished by request of the churches in Hesse and Waldeck, in 1797. In 1824 it was published in Upper Canada. In 1844 it was reprinted and introduced in the churches in Pennsylvania. In 1848 it was translated into the English language and published by the Eastern District Conference. Since then it has passed through many editions. At the regular session of the General Conference of the Mennonite Church of North America, con-vened in the Alexanderwohl Church, Kansas, in October of 1896, it was ordered to appear in a revised edition, and is now published by the Mennonite Book Concern.

TOEWS-Rites for Geo. P. Toews, 65, pioneer farmer of the Kremlin community, were to be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Fos-sett-Schaeffer Funeral home chapel, with further services at 3 o'clock in the Mennonite church, north of Enid.

Burial was to be in the church cemetery beside a daughter who died several months ago.

Pallbearers were to be cousins of Toews. They are A. A. John, H. A., D. A., and A. G. Toews and G. D. Ediger.

Toews died Monday morning in an Enid hospital.

He came to Oklahoma in 1903, making his home on a farm 2½ miles south of Kremlin.

He is survived by his wife; four sons, Henry, Peter, Jacob and David all of Kremlin; two daughters, Mrs. Peter Vogt of Kremlin and Mrs. G. A. Toews of Enid; two brothers, one in California and the other in British Columbia and two sisters in Saskatchewan, Canada.

Funeral services for George H Toews, 65 years old, who died Mon day morning in an Enid hospita probably will be Thursday, it wa announced at the Fossett-Schaeffe funeral home last night.

Toews, a farmer of the Kremlin community, died of a heart ailmen after a four-day illness.

He had lived on a farm two an one-half miles southwest of Kremli since coming to Oklahoma in 1903.

A daughter, Miss Anna Toews, school teacher, died a few month ago.

He is survived by his wife of th home; four sons, Henry, Pete Jacob and David, all of Kremlin two daughters, Mrs. Peter Vogt o Kremlin, and Mrs. G. A. Toews of Enid; two brothers, one in Cal. fornia, and the other in Britis Columbia, and two sisters living i Saskatchewan, Canada.

A more detailed obituary for George P Toews, translated by Alf Berg, is below (3 pages)

Br. Gerhard P. Toews. - I was born in South Russia the 11th of November, old style, or the 23rd of November, new style, 1874. (Note: Russia did not adopt the Gregorian calendar until 1918.) Emigrated from Russia to America with my parents, Isaak and Elisabeth Toews in the summer of 1878. Arrived in York County, Nebraska, and settled near Hampton, Hampton County, Nebraska.

My father went to be with the Lord December 19, 1884. Then May 2, 1884 Mother married Peter Block. I received in him a good, honest stepfather, who gave me much good advice, and who also admonished me that I should be converted to the Lord, which my father on his deathbed had already laid on my heart. In the summer of 1889 the Ministers Peter H. Wedel and Cornelius Janzen came to Nebraska and conducted revival meetings. Through the sermons and the Holy Spirit I was convinced that I should change my way of life. I began to pray again. As a child I had already prayed at Mother's knees, but since then not as I should have. I asked forgiveness of my parents and also of others whom I had offended. Thereupon I found peace in the blood of Jesus. I was especially impressed by the sermon regarding Lazarus, whom Jesus raised from the dead. At that time Jesus said, "Unbind him and let him go." Jesus had also unbound me. In August 1889 I was baptized into Christ's death in Beaver Creek south of Hampton, Nebraska, and later received into the M. B. Church of Henderson, Nebraska.

On the 28th of January 1897 I was joined in holy matrimony to Anna Buller. Elder Johann J. Regier performed the ceremony.

On the 18th of November 1903 we moved hier to Oklahoma and settled on a farm near Kremlin, Garfield County. The Lord has permitted us to experience many good things, though we sometimes went though difficult times, especially when the children were sick or when accidents happened, but the Lord gave grace that we were able to thank Him. We are not worthy of His goodness and faithfulness that He rendered to us in our lives. (This far by Br. Toews.)

Br. Toews had been in good health nearly his entire lifetime. However, since his daughter Anna's serious illness and especially since her death one perceived signs of decrepitude off and on in him. Anna's departure weighed heavily on him. It was difficult for him to become accustomed to her loss. At least that experience had an injurious effect on his health. He said repeatedly, "I wish I could speak with Anna a little once more."

Recently he complained about severe fatigue. Regarding this he sought the good advice of a doctor. He asked for medicine that would cure his fatigue. After more careful examination the doctor informed him that his heart showed signs of "exhaustion or collapse" (congestive heart failure). The doctor gave him medicine for that purpose, which he also took, but work of any consequence he was not able to do. He complained repeatedly about difficulty in breathing. He would pitch in and help with less strenuous tasks until he would receive a severe attack.

Comment:

The obituary is richly embellished with numerous German idioms that are a little difficult to translate literally. In my copy of the original I have underscored a number of these idioms and would be glad to discuss their meaning with you. Maybe in my attempt to be as literal as possible, I ended up with some awkward sentences. You might proof read the translation and indicate what you would like changed. R. C. Seibel certainly was a master at writing obituaries in the style and detail that no doubt was customary 50 years ago. I was impressed at the detailed account of Gerhard's salvation experience as well as the detailed picture of his deteriorating health. No doubt most of the "outline" obituaries today present a less adequate picture of the life of the deceased. Thinking about remarks that he made off and on in recent times, led one to believe that he had a premonition of his approaching death. Just two weeks ago he said to some brethren at the close of the church service that he regretted that his time on earth was so short. On that Sunday his participation in the Sunday School lesson was not what one was accustomed to hear from him. His spirit seemed to be stirred by more serious thoughts. Tuesday evening, the 16th of July, he called his family together for evening devotions. He told his family that this would not happen often any more. This declaration was significant, since on the following Wednesday evening, the 17th of July about 11:00 oclock, he suddenly experienced severe shortness of his condition and decided to immediately take him to the doctor. However, at the departure from home he told his family that he did not want to go to the hospital. But as they approached town, he asked the family to take him to the hospital. He was still able to walk into the hospital, but then his strength failed him. Everything possible was done to prolong his life but without lasting success. Monday morning July 22 at about 10:15 his diseased heart failed completely and he passed away at the age of 65 years, 7 months and 29 days.

In him the family has lost a loving, caring, kind and intimate father, the church a faithful supporter and the community a citizen with extensive interests. In the family he was everything that is contained in the word "father", in the church a loving brother in Christ and in the community a respected citizen. He esteemed the congregation of believers highly. He also sought the fellowship of ministers even outside the brotherhood. He did not discriminate between the poor and the rich. He was a blessing to the world. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on. Yes, says the Spirit, they will rest from their labor, for their deeds will follow them."

Sorrowing his early and sudden departure are: his loving wife, one daughter, one stepdaughter, four sons, two sons-inlaw, three daughters-in-law, twelve grandchildren, two brothers, two sisters, who because of the distance are not able to attend the funeral; five brothers-in-law, six sisters-in-law, and many relatives and friends. Daughter Anna preceeded him in death about 80 days on May 2, 1940. The journeys that he was able to take meant a great deal to him, but now he has been able to take his best final journey. We feel that his farewell message is fittingly expressed in the following verse:

Farewell, you precious ones, farewell! We are parting at this time with love. Farewell, until we see each other again When we stand before God's throne.

Mrs. Anna Toews, nee Buller, our dear beloved mother, daughter of Henry and Sarah Buller, was born in Marion County, Kansas, on April 5, 1875, exchanged this life with eternity on November 25, 1947, at the age of 72 years, 7 months and 20 days. Her parents immigrated to America with the first contingent of immigrants in 1874, settling in Kansas. At the age of 16 years she moved with her parents to Hamilton County. Nebraska, where they established their home. Realizing her lost and undone condition, she accepted Christ as her Saviour, and on May 27, 1894, she was baptized and received into active membership into the M. B. church remaining true to her Lord and the church to the end. On January 28, 1897, she was united into holy matrimony with our father, George P. Toews, who was called from her side in July, 1940, remaining in widowhood, to her death. To this union six children were born; four sons and two daughters; daughter Anna preceded her in death in May, 1940. In 1901 another member was added to the family circle in Mary Neuman, who received the parental love and affection, until she married and established her own home. She was always considered as one of the family, including her own family.

In) 1903 our parents moved to Oklahoma, and settled on a farm near Kremlin, where she made her home for 39 years, enduring the hardships of a pioneer life with the neighbors. God blessed their [line(s) missing in copy above]

in the course of time they were privilege to have a settled life. She bore her trials and bereavements, caused by the death of loved one, and the result of war, as her sons were called into service, with great fortitude, but decided in 1942 to move to Kremlin, where she made her home until her death. She was to us a loving and praying mother.

About a year ago she began to fail, and medical aid was sought, but without much avail. In October, 1947, she was transferred to a hospital for a week, for closer observation, then was taken to her home, but her condition was such, that after two weeks at home, which time was mostly spent in bed, she was again taken to a hospital, where after three weeks she quietly passed out of this life. She received the best medical care and attention, and everything was done to improve her condition, but in vain. May she rest in peace.

She leaves to mourn: One daughter, Clara, Mrs. P. H. Voth, one foster daughter, Mary, Mrs. Geo. Toews; four sons, Henry G., Peter I., Jacob B., and David A. Toews, two sons-in-law, four daughtersin-law, 14 grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, three brothers, Peter A., Henry T., and John Buller, all of Enid, and many friends and relatives. It is so lonesome here without you And sad and weary the way; Life is not the same to us Since you are called away. But in God's dear home you are So safe, no suffering, tears or care And in His own time, we'll find You waiting over there.

Pallbearers will be G. H. Jantzen, H. H. Jantzen, J. J. Thesman, Jacob A. Voth, J. E. Eger, and E. A. Toews.

The Children.

The parents of **Grandpa George P Toews** were **Isaac and Elizabeth** *Peters* **Toews** (see "Ancestors of Arrel Toews" for more details). Isaac died from Influenza in 1884, soon after reaching the US (Hampton/Aurora NE area) and Elizabeth soon remarried - to Peter Block. They lived for a number of years in NE, then in ND, then in Saskatchewan, where she is buried.

Great-Grandpa Isaac Toews died when Grandpa George P Toews was about 10 yrs old, so his later childhood/early manhood was as part of the Peter Block family near Aurora NE. Isaac Toews is buried on some farm near Henderson NE, but we have been unable to locate his gravesite. See "Ancestors of Arrel Toews" for photo and additional information.

The land formerly owned by Isaac Toews, and later by Peter and Elisabeth Peters Toews Block following Isaac's death in 1884, was sold for \$7530 to Paul Strehlow on 27 August 1903, just months before Grandparents George P and Anna Buller Toews moved to Kremlin OK. See 1888 plat map of Beaver Precinct, Hamilton County NE on p 71 of "Ancestors of Arrel Toews" for location of this farmland (80 acres plus almost adjacent 40 acres), just 5 & W of the town of Hampton NE. After the Peter Block family moved to ND, George P Toews farmed this land prior to moving in November 1903 to Kremlin OK. Settlement document and balance sheet are shown below. Settlement was made in Rose Hill ND, where the Peter Block family, including all of George P Toews' siblings, had moved. George P Toews received a total of \$1616.41 from this settlement. Some memories of our father, David A Toews, about his father George P Toews and various other forebears (from an interview with Dad by his son Galen, ca 2000).

Our GG-Grandfather Gerhard Isaac Toews lived outside the "dorf" of Landskrone in a big white stone house and was considered one of the well-heeled members of that Molotschna Colony village. He was one of the full-fledged landowners in the Landskrone village (see "Ancestors of Arrel Toews" for details of land-holding arrangements in the Molotschna S Russia colony), and family lands were sometimes divided among sons (only!). [Gerhard Isaac came to America in 1882, several years after his son Isaac, our G-Grandfather, immigrated].

In contrast, our G-Grandfather Heinrich J Buller (p 16-19) was not "landed," and when he married, no land was available for him, so he says he was a "Sheet Vert" (Shit's Worth!) that ended up coming to America instead (he was a member of the Alexanderwohl village).

A bit of additional information about Peter and Elisabeth Peters Toews Block: Peter was born in Poland on 18 March 1856. When he was 1 year old, his family moved from Poland to S Russia in a 2-wheeled cart pulled by his father. He immigrated from S Russia to NE in 1884 and soon lost his wife. On 2/3 May 1885, he married recently widowed Elizabeth Peters Toews, my G-Grandmother. In 1897, their combined family (except for Grandpa George P Toews & wife Anna) moved 600 miles N to Langdon ND in a wagon train lead by Peter Block, then in 1911 on to Kelstern, Saskatchewan Canada, 470 miles WNW by rail. They joined the Seventh Day Adventist Church in 1908 and followed this faith the remainder of their lives. <u>Peter</u> died on 15 August 1925, and <u>Elizabeth</u> on 5 April 1937. They are both buried in the <u>Elim Mennonite</u> <u>Brethren Cemetery</u>, Morse, Moose Jaw Census Division, Saskatchewan Canada. Their obituaries, provided by Myron Toews, are below. Obituary

BLOCK—Peter Block was born in Poland, March 18, 1856. When he was a year old, in a two-wheeled cart pulled by his father, they moved to Russia.

In 1884 they moved to Nebraska where he lost his first wife. In 1885 he was married to Mrs. Elizabeth Toews, daughter of Peters.

In the year 1897 they moved to North Dakota, where he heard the Third Angel's Message of Rev. 14:6-7. Again in 1911 they moved to Saskatchewan.

The fourth day of August they came home from a visiting trip, the same night he was paralyzed, then he was in bed for ten days. Many friends came visiting during this time, but he was speechless and on the 15th he passed away. His trust and confidence was in the Lord. He is survived by his wife, four children, three step-children, forty-five grand-children, and a large circle

of friends. The help of his faithfulness will be remembered by the Kelstern church.

Block.—Elizabeth Block was born in the village of Landskran, Russia, June 4, 1852. She was united in marriage to Isaac Toews in 1874. and came to the United States in 1878. Her husband died in 1884. and in 1885 she was married to Peter Block. They joined the Seventhday Adventist Church in 1908 and remained faithful to the truth.

Sister Block died on April 5, 1937 at Kelstern, Sask., at the age of eighty-four years. She leaves to mourn six children, fifty-two grandchildren, and thirty greatgrandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted by the writer, together with the Mennonite minister, in the Mennonite church near Kelstern, Sask. She died in the hope of the first resurrection. A. M. BAYBARZ. Some additional information about the 3 siblings of Grandpa George P Toews and his 5 Block half-siblings; all generously supplied by my brother Myron Toews after many years of laborious inquiries and research. We are deeply indebted to him for his efforts.

Peter Block married widow Elizabeth Toews on 2/3 May 1885 in Hampton NE. By October 1893, they had 5 children - Peter P, Helena, Heinrich, Tina & Anna. In 1897, all of George P Toews' single siblings moved with Peter and Elizabeth *Peters Toews* Block and their 5 children to the Alsen-Munich ND area, just S of the Canadian border. George P Toews had married Anna Buller and stayed in NE to work the family farm. The Blocks later moved to Kelstern Saskatchewan.

Myron Toews has compiled an excellent and comprehensive history of the Peter & Elizabeth Block family with many vintage photos, and anyone interested in this family should <u>contact him</u>.

Oldest George P Toews sibling Isaac P Toews wed Susanna "Suzie" Froese in June 1900 in ND. In 1914, they moved to S Saskatchewan (Rush Lake). Wedding and 50th Anniversary photos shown at R.





Middle sibling Elizabeth Toews (b 16 October 1879) married Peter H Peters on 16 August 1900 in Roseville ND. They are shown at L with oldest daughter, also named Elizabeth. Mother Elizabeth died 29 January 1908, shortly after the birth of their 4th child Mary. Other children were Anna & Peter.

The parents of Grandma Anna Buller Toews were Heinrich J and Sara Buller Buller (see "Ancestors of Arrel Toews" for more details). G-GPa Heinrich J. Buller was born 9 Dec 1850 and G-GMa Sara Buller Buller on 25 Nov 1845, both in Alexanderwohl, Molotschna, S Russia. They married on 30 Nov 1872 in Alexanderwohl. In 1874, led by Elder Jakob Buller, most of the <u>Alexanderwohl colony</u> immigrated *en masse* to the current Alexanderwohl community near Goessel KS. The Bullers moved from the Alexanderwohl Colony near Goessel KS to Hamilton County NE in 1888, then to near Kremlin OK on 20 September 1902, where they lived in a "shack" on our "40". Sara died of the flu on 25 Feb 1928 in her home near Kremlin OK. Heinrich died on 15 January 1937 in the guest bedroom of our family farmhouse, where my Dad found him hanging from a window sashcord.

HENRY BULLER Found Hanging In Farm Home

Family Says Aged Man Has Been in Poor Health for Few Years

Henry J. Buller, 86, was found dead in a bedroom at the home of his son-in-law and wife, Mr. and Mrs. George P. Toews, southwest of Kremlin, about 5:20 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

He had looped a piece of window sash cord about his neck, tied it to a piece of upright furniture in the room, and was found dangling from the noose, Ferd Brakhage, deputy sheriff, and Rugh Conway, assistant county attorney, who investigated the case, reported.

The family said he had eaten a hearty meal at noon and told them he was feeling fine. They could ascribe no motive for suicide, but said he had been in poor health the past few years.

Apparently he had been dead for some time, the investigators said. Members of the family missed him, and went to look for him. A nephew found the body in the bedroom.

Surviving are his daughter, Mrs. Toews, with whom he made his home; a son, Henry H. Buller, south of Enid; Peter A. Buller, Enid route four; and John Buller of Enid.

The body was removed to the Brown Funeral home to be prepared for burial and cared for until last rites are arranged.

Peter H and Clara Toews Voth

Clara Elizabeth Toews was born 3 April 1902 near Hamilton, Hamilton County NE. She was the oldest child of George P and Anna Toews. Peter Harold Voth was born on 31 May 1900 in Henderson, York County NE, the son of Jacob J (1870-1938) and Anna J Toews Voth (1872-1943). Peter H Voth was a brother of my mother's father, Jacob Albert Voth (my Grandpa Voth). Clara and Peter married on 28 May 1922 in the N Enid MB Church.

Uncle Pete and Aunt Clara had 4 children: <u>Ernest</u> <u>Henry</u> (married to Virgie Dezort), <u>Robert P "Bob"</u> (married to <u>Carol Helena Epp</u>), Johnny Eugene (married to <u>MaryAnn Sherley</u>), and <u>Dorothy Ann</u> (married to <u>Gene Gray</u>). The family lived most of their lives on their home-place just W of Kremlin OK, with its well-known big red barn and attached



silo (NE/4-21-24N-6W). Earlier, the family lived on the Butler Place (SW/4-19-24N-6W), in the home that later became Bob Voth's home-place, in the "Garold and Betty Fox" house on the W side of Kremlin, and even in their chicken house (see following page) when they built the current house on the Pete Voth homeplace.

Uncle Pete was an energetic and hard-driven farmer, and he raised his sons to be the same - he did quite well in this aspect! I worked for the "Voth Brothers" (Ernie, Bob & John) through high school and college and learned both the value and price of unrelenting hard work and constant maximal effort. For their later years, Pete and Clara moved to Kremlin, adjacent to the Kremlin Methodist Church. Johnny and MaryAnn Voth later



lived on the Pete Voth homeplace in the same, although extensively remodeled, house.









Henry George and Elsie Marie Schmidt Toews

Henry George was the oldest son of George P and Anna Toews. He was born on 10 August 1904 near Kremlin, OK (in the George P Toews home-place house). He married Elsie Marie Schmidt on 18 October 1931 in Dalmeny, Saskatchewan, Canada. Elsie Schmidt was born on 17 February 1904 in Rosthern, Saskatchewan, Canada, the daughter of Aron and Maria *Wiens* Schmidt.

Uncle Henry was the banker in Kremlin (Bank of Kremlin) for many years. Henry's daughter Gerry says her dad really wanted to be educated but there was no high school in Kremlin, so after much persuading, Henry's father, George P, agreed to send him to high school in Enid, renting a room for him in town, but with the caveat that Henry would return home whenever needed for farm work especially when spring planting time arrived. After graduation,




Henry chose not to farm and managed to get a job as an apprentice at the Bank of Kremlin in 1923, working the first year for his noon lunch. He walked to the bank every morning (almost 2 miles) and the bank paid for his lunch at the Kremlin Hotel, just S of the bank. She says he loved the food, being introduced to sardines and other fare, and enjoyed banking as well. After the first year of employment, he began earning a small salary, but still helped out on the farm. Henry eventually purchased most of the bank, perhaps from "Uncle" John Eger (no relation; just the endearment Henry and his family always used), or perhaps from George Austin & HA Reed (see Bank of Kremlin ad from 19 October 1916 Kremlin Journal, on p 29). John E. Eger, Jr. remained as an officer in the bank after it changed hands. He was the other person in the bank when I was a child and teenager. I never knew him to smile. John Eger and his family are shown in front of Rathmel Grocery (next page), which was adjacent and shared a wall with the Bank of Kremlin. Aunt Elsie also worked in the Bank of Kremlin, as a teller and posting checks, balancing books, &c. Herb Thesman also worked in the bank.

Henry and Elsie lived in Kremlin, in the same block as the bank and just E of the Community Hall, for most of their lives, adding onto the original small house as their family grew and life got better, until finally moving to 1615 S. Hayes Street in Enid OK in 1969, where Henry continued his banking activities as Cashier at the Security National Bank, continuing to serve in that capacity until his sudden death. In 1969, he "sold" the bank to VW Mendenhall, I believe with significant involvement of the Zaloudeks. The Henry and Elsie Toews house and detached garage on 5th St in Kremlin still stands today (photos on p 28).






My only known photos of the Bank of Kremlin are below: (L), Arrel & Galen in our 1950 Chevrolet "Deluxe" in front of the bank - Dad was picking up Uncle Henry's Argus C3 camera and light meter, as well as traveler's checks, prior to our 1954 family vacation to Estes Park & Rocky Mountain National Park, CO. The badly underexposed photo was Dad's first attempt at picture taking, under Uncle Henry's tutelage. Remarkably, our subsequent CO slides turned out just fine! (R), Bank of Kremlin after a storm, date unknown. Rathmel Grocery/Post Office to the r; note Pepsi-Cola sign on N door. I believe the banker, Henry Toews, and Rueben Thesman are the two individuals shown in the photo inspecting storm damage. I remember Rueben's blue Ford pickup with red bull-leader hitch.



Peter Isaac and Thelma Ione Malter Toews

Peter Isaac Toews was born 20 January 1907 in the George P Toews home W of Kremlin OK. Thelma Ione "Toots" Malter was born on 16 July 1906 in Caseyville, St Clair County IL, the daughter of George John (1856-1937) and Katherine Ellen *Pausch* Malter (1862-1938). Her family moved to the Kremlin area in 1909. She graduated from Enid High School and, after earning her teaching certificate, taught school in Hillsdale and Sinclair (NE of Covington). Uncle Pete and Aunt Thelma were married on 21 December 1946 in Wichita KS. She subsequently graduated from Central State University (Edmond OK), and from 1953-1971, taught in Enid schools. She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, Neal Chapter.

Uncle Pete inherited 2 farms SE of Kremlin (SW/4-31-24N-5W and NW/4-6-23N-5W) during the settlement of Grandma Anna Toews' estate after her passing in 1947. The history of these farms prior to that settlement are complicated and tortuous, but seem to involve Uncle Henry and the Bank of Kremlin, with acquisition of one farm by the bank in 1935-36, then transfer to Grandpa George P Toews. At the time of acquisition, the farm was known as the "Dolan Place" -Mr. Dolan was an Irishman who got the land by a homesteading claim in the 16 September <u>1893</u> <u>Cherokee Outlet Land Run</u>, but he mortgaged the farm and paid off his loans by renting the land to others; nobody has any knowledge of Mr. Dolan ever actually farming his land.

According to Pete and Thelma's son, Curtis (Chip), the house on the S Place was originally constructed for Jake and Anna Toews, and perhaps they lived on this farm for a few years, but only until the 1947 settlement. Pete and Thelma moved into the home on their farms 3 mi S and 3 mi E of Kremlin soon after marrying (Pete had been living with his mother, Anna Toews in her house in Kremlin after returning from WW-II service in 1945 until his marriage to Thelma). They only lived on their S farm for a few years (according to Chip, "from the spring of 1947 to the fall of 1952"), when Chip was very young. Moving to Enid in 1953, they spent one year in an apartment on W Pine and another year in an apartment on W Oklahoma before moving to their own home at 705 W Mulberry Avenue (below), where the family lived for most of their lives. In

1984, they moved to Austin TX to be near Chip and Rosa for their remaining days.

The house on Uncle Pete's S farm was purchased by Henry G Toews and moved adjacent to his home on 5^{th} St in Kremlin in 1959/60. This is the house where we stored our furniture and other family belongings temporarily after the

May 1961 tornado destroyed our house. It was later occupied by Merlin Rodgers, Principal and my science/math teacher at Kremlin High School, and his family. The house still stands today (photo at R).

For most or all of his post-farming years, Uncle Pete drove a red Texaco gas delivery truck for Ernie S Blanton Texaco, 101 E York Ave in Enid OK (3 blocks S of Rock Island depot, E side of tracks). He delivered to farmers E of US-81 and was somewhat famous among his nieces and nephews for

giving out shiny dimes to the nieces and sticks of Adams clove and/or licorice chewing gum to

the nephews (neither of which we liked very much!). He was always very



jovial and friendly and liked to visit before, during, and after filling our fuel tanks.

My Dad, David A Toews and his three sons farmed Uncle Pete's two farms for many years, until Dad retired from farming in 1977. Bob Voth farmed

this land for 1 year (until he became sick and soon passed away), then Bob's oldest son, Dean, took over and has managed these farms until recently. I have many fond memories (and some not so fond) of plowing and harvesting wheat on these two farms, not to mention minding our cattle on pastures on both sides of the road, sometimes hauling water from Enid during dry spells. Chip still owns these two family farms and has been busy cementing his legacy of this land with additional land on the S section (SE & SW quarters), construction of a lake and shelterbelt, and seeding his lands with native prairie grasses and forbs. Good for him!

Chip married Rosa Gonzalez on 17 November 1979, and they live in Austin TX. In 1984, Pete and Thelma moved to Austin TX to be near their son.

Pete died on 31 May 1986 at age 79 in Austin TX and Thelma on 1 August 1989 at age 82, also in Austin TX. Both <u>Pete</u> and <u>Thelma</u> are buried in Section A of the <u>Enid OK Memorial</u> <u>Park Cemetery</u>.



Jacob Benjamin was born on 27 April 1909 in the George P Toews home near Kremlin OK (Toews homeplace). On 19 March 1939, he married Anna Helen Baergen in Corn OK. Anna was born 15

November 1908 in Corn OK. Jake died 21 May 1977 in Halstead KS at age 68 and Anna died 2 June 1999 in Hesston KS. <u>Jake</u> and <u>Anna</u> are both buried in the <u>Hesston KS Cemetery</u>. Uncle Jake wrote a nice "History of Kremlin, Oklahoma" when a Junior at Kremlin High School – I have a copy and it is well worth reading! Please ask for it.



Richard "Dick" Jacob is their only son; he married

Ruth Ann Detweiler on 19 May 1961 in Hesston KS. They currently reside in Showalter Villa, Hesston KS.

In their later years, Uncle Jake and Aunt Anne moved to Buhler KS, and after retiring, explored the USA in Jake's pickup with mounted camper. After Uncle Jake's death, Aunt Anne moved to Hesston KS. 





OBITUARY

Our beloved daughter and sister, Anna Rosella Toews, was born March 12, 1913 on the "home place" one and one-half miles west of Kremlin, Okla., and died Thursday, May 2, 1940 in an Enid hospital at the age of 27 years, one month, and 20 days.

Her elementary and secondary education up to the eleventh grade she received in the Kremlin public schools. May 29, 1930 she was graduated with honors from the Enid high school. During the school year of 1930-31 she attended Tabor college, Hillsboro, Kan. Since then she attended the summer school in Phillips university, Enid, for five or six summers in order to keep pace with the state certificate requirements.

Since the fall of 1931 she was employed as teacher in the public schools of Oklahoma. She apparently enjoyed her work, and her work apparently was recognized, for in every school she taught she was re-employed after the first year of teaching. During the nine years of her teaching experience she was obliged to quit during the middle of two terms, because of illness.


She was an inspiration to the home, maintaining a cheerful state of mind under all circumstances. In the early months of 1938 she accidentally discovered a growth in the lower region of her chest. She consulted competent physicians. After careful diagnosis, she was subjected to radium treaments for several weeks. When the appropriate time arrived, the growth was removed by operation. Laboratory analysis revealed that the growth was an uncontrollable transplanting growth, which finally infested her brain.

The two years following the operation she occasionally complained

of headaches, but enjoyed good health otherwise. Both years she was employed as teacher in the Columbia school district. On the evening of February 9, 1940 she insisted on attending a sacred program given by a quartet from Tabor college in the city of Enid. Because of the facts that the weather was cold, and that she had worked hard all week, mother prevailed upon her to stay home and rest, for that same group was to give a program in our church on the Sunday evening following that Friday evening. But she insisted on going, because, as she intimated, "we do not know what might happen by Sunday evening." She was correct in her contention, for on Saturday afternoon on February 10 she was overtaken by serious fainting spells. She never entered the threshhold of this church again. The best medical aid, and the best hospital care was given her during the three months of her illness, but it was only for the purpose of making life most pleasant during her stay on earth. She desired to stay with us a little longer, and we wanted her with us a little longer, but "God's way is the best way." In her prayers during her illness she was submissive, always expressing her wish to recover, but she also expressed that she was willing to go, if it were the will of God. Physically, she fought a commendable fight; she never complained seriously; almost up to her end she maintained a cheerful state of mind. Only the hope of the redeemed makes that possible.

She accepted the Lord Jesus as her personal Savior in the winter of 1931 while attending Tabor college.

She leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George P. Toews, one sister, one foster-sister, four brothers, one brother-in-law, two sisters-in-law, four nephews, three nieces, two aunts, five uncles, and many relatives and friends.



DEATH CLAIMS Anna B. Toews, Teacher, age 27

Rites Pending for Veteran Teacher at Columbia School

Anna B. Toews, 27 years old, a Garfield county school teacher, died at 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon in an Enid hospital after a four-months illness.

Miss Toews had taught school for nine years and at the time of ner illness was teacher at the Columbia district school north of Enid on U. S. highway 81. She became ill during the Christmas vacation and had not been teaching since that time.

Funeral services will be in charge of the Schaeffer Funeral home. Miss Toews was born and reared in the Kremlin community.

She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George P. Toews, Kremlin; two sisters, Mrs. P. H. Voth of Kremlin and Mrs. G. A. Toews, Enid; four brothers, Henry G. Toews, Peter I. Toews, Jacob B. Toews, and David A. Toews, all of Kremlin.

David Abraham Toews, my father, was born on 20 October 1916 on our family farm ~1.5 mi W of Kremlin OK (NE/4-20-24N-6W), the youngest of six children. His wife (my mother), **Rosa Marie Voth Toews**, was born 15 September 1918 on the **Butler Place** (SW/4-19-24N-6W; N across from our Houghtaling Farm) near Kremlin OK. David and Rosa were married on 3 August 1943 in the North Enid Mennonite Brethren Church They lived most all of their married life on the George P Toews homeplace $1\frac{1}{4}$ mi W of Kremlin OK.

David farmed most of his life, including renting farms from Uncle Henry and Uncle Pete Toews. He raised wheat, silage, cattle, and, with his sons, registered Hampshire sheep, and also drove a bus for Kremlin School, while Mom was homemaker and a long-time legal secretary for Belcher, Belcher & Collins in Enid OK.

David passed from this earth at age of 87 on 12 December 2003, and Rosa on 25 February 1998 at age 79, both in Enid OK. <u>Rosa</u> and <u>David</u> are buried in the <u>North Enid MB cemetery</u>.

Arrel Dwayne was born in St. Mary's Hospital Annex in Enid OK on 22 July 1948. On 19 June 1971, he married Kathy (Kathleen Kay) Neufeld (daughter of Leon and Viola Esther Fadenrecht Neufeld) in Balko OK. Kathy was born 27 August 1949 in Perryton TX. Arrel was at the UNC School of Medicine in Chapel Hill, NC (Professor of Biochemistry) for 38 years. Both Kathy and Arrel are now retired and live in Carrboro NC. They have 2 daughters, Erin Lynne (b 28 September 1985 in Durham NC; married to David Austin Lemon on 9 April 2005) and Laura Kathleen (b 18 December 1985 in Durham NC; married to Barron Black Martin on 23 March 2019). Erin and Dave

have 2 sons, Austin Jacob (b 9 August 2010) and Benjamin Arrel (b 12 May 2013). Barron Black Martin III was born to Laura and Barron on 18 May 2021 and Elizabeth "Ellie" Kathleen on 28 March 2023. Erin and Dave reside in Crozet VA and Laura and Barron in Bethesda MD.



Maria "Aunt Mary" Neuman Toews

Aunt Mary Neumann was unofficially adopted by the George P Toews family. Her parents were <u>Bernhard</u> and Maria Benke Neuman. Mary was born 5 January 1895 near Henderson NE. When she was 5 years old, her mother died, leaving Bernhard with 6 orphaned children. The father gave these children to other people to raise and provide for them. Mary was given




to neighbors, the Jacob Voths (likely either Jacob and Anna or Jacob J and Anna J, our GGand G-Grandparents, respectively). Mary was with them only one year when the Voths decided to move to OK. Since Mary's father did not want them to take her away to OK, he asked a young couple, George P and Anna Buller Toews, to take Mary and raise her. In 1903, George and Anna moved to OK as well, and this time her father did not object to them taking Mary along. They moved to near Kremlin OK, where Mary attended Kremlin Schools. She married George (Gerhard A) Toews (born 14 December 1885 in NE), on 29 August 1915. George was the son of Abraham Toews, brother to our G-Grandfather Isaac Toews. George died 14 October 1949 at age 64 and she died in Enid OK on 9 April 1981 at age 86. Both Mary and George are buried in the NEMB Cemetery. Much of above information is from Mary's obituary, provided by Gerry Toews Reimer.

When we were young, Aunt Mary was often at family gatherings such as Christmas family dinners.

David Toews Reminisces

ARREL\WRITE\ARREL'S ANCESTORS\3.GEORGE P TOEWS FAMILY\DAVID TOEWS REMINISCES-GALEN INTERVIEW DATE UNKNOWN

The following was transcribed from a tape recording of our father David A. Toews reminiscing and answering written questions posed by our brother Galen Toews. The date of the recording is unknown. David Toews died on 12 December 2003 and Galen Toews died on 12 October 2011.

Because Galen is interviewing and David is answering, there is sometimes confusion about whose Gpa/GGPa is being referred to, so I have inserted in **red** the correct identification.

Grandpa Toews (George P) was 4 years old when he came to the United States and he did not remember one single thing about the trip because when his Dad (Isaac) died, they all had terrible high fever from influenza, and he remembered nothing from before that thing happened. Mrs. George Janzen's mother was on the ship with him, and they played together on the ship, and she remembered all of that, but he could remember nothing of that. They lived at Aurora, Nebraska a little bit west and south of Aurora.

As far as grandpa and grandma (George P and Anna) meeting, I know nothing about that, except that they lived fairly close together. Where they lived when they first got married, I don't know. Shortly after they were married, Grandma Block (our G-Gma Block) (at that time) sold the homestead and he got his inheritance which was what he bought the first farm with, which was the farm that Uncle Henry has 3 forties of, and we have 1 forty. And then he bought the east hundred acres of the home place. He didn't have enough money to handle all of that and so Grandpa Buller took the 40 that we now have and moved the house on there. Mom and Dad (George P & Anna) lived on the home place.

Did he (George P) ever work at any other jobs? No, not after he got married, that was one thing he swore that would never happen is that his boys would be hired out for work for anybody else. They were going to go into farming on their own. Aunt Mary came into the household presumably because they (George & Anna) couldn't have any children. And Aunt Mary was orphaned because her mother died and her father had a number of children and he started farming them out, so Grandpa and Grandma (George & Anna) went and got Aunt Mary. Shortly after Aunt Mary was in the home, Grandma (Anna) became pregnant and had Aunt Clara.

As far as the decision to move to Oklahoma, I think the land was too high in Nebraska and your Great-Grandpa Voth (Jacob J) was a very good friend of Grandpa (George P) Toews and as far as I know was already living in Oklahoma at that time. So Grandpa (George P) bought (owned; bought earlier?) 120 acres plus 100 when he first came here. Another interesting thing about this is - and I don't know how authentic this is, but Uncle Pete said something in the last years

that Grandpa (George P) Toews was supposed to get the farm where Harve Smith lived on originally and when he got to Oklahoma, this land here west of Kremlin was shoved off on him instead of the Harve Smith place [this farm is on US-81, on the Garfield/Grant County line, about 3 miles N of the Midway].

How quickly was additional land bought? That I don't know, but he bought the west 60 of the home place from old man Sperling (in Oct 1910), who was the father-in-law of Uncle Pete Buller (James Buller's Gpa). At that time or before that time, Uncle Pete Bullers lived on the George Janzen farm [S & W across road from our farm].

Grandpa (George P) Toews served on the school board for quite a number of years, and I think after the depression when the Bank of Kremlin almost went under, Grandpa was also on the bank board for a number of years.

He was on the Board of Trustees for a number of years in the local Mennonite church, taught Sunday school and some things like that. As far as his religious beliefs, he was a stern Christian. What principles were most important? I think they were honesty and dedication to going to church and Sunday school.

I can't say too much about his stand on peace, because during the years that he and I lived together, there was very little talk of war. He was very stern on justice and what was right and that we should always pay our debts; if we made debts to pay them. He believed in conversion and right living. He gave to the church and missions, but not in any large amounts that I know. He went to church conferences, especially in his later years and for a number of years was a free-lance correspondent for the "Vorwärts" now the Hillsboro Journal.

To your surprise, he (George P?) attended high school for a short time, where I do not know. He was very interested in education and was one of the very first local Mennonites who insisted that his boys get a high school education. I was encouraged to go to high school but not encouraged to go to college. He could talk English and could communicate in German and very fluently in Low German.

How did you view your father? Well, I better not go into that.

Grandpa (George P) Toews was hired out as a hired servant at the age of ten. He had to harrow corn with an old team of horses that probably walked down the row and he had to pull from one side to the other and probably worried a lot about it because he vowed that none of his boys would ever be hired out. I think that Grandpa (Peter) Block, being a vagabond, decided to go to South Dakota (quite certain it was North Dakota) where there was new land to be taken and at that time Grandpa and Grandma (George P & Anna) moved on to the home place and evidently, before they moved to Oklahoma they decided to sell the homestead in Nebraska and beings that Grandpa (G-Gpa Isaac) Toews had died, Dad (George P) and his brothers and sisters inherited a portion of that and that was the money that Grandpa (George P) Toews used to buy the land that he bought here at Kremlin. (He got \$1616.41 from the Isaac Toews estate settlement but spent a lot more buying the land in OK).

I think that Grandpa (George P) Toews must have come between 1902 and 1904 (GRANDMA says Nov 1903) and probably loaded all the possessions into the box car and maybe a cattle car: the horses, the wagon, the walking plow, the furniture and maybe a cow or two that they brought to Oklahoma. The farm that he bought here, I think that all it had on it was a dugout. Where they lived, I don't know, but they built the original house. As I remember them talking about it, there was an old shed here. Dad (George P) also built the old red barn and Grandpa (Henry J) Buller moved a house from Kremlin onto his 40.

Rockenbeck (Rockenbach) homesteaded this (our) farm and as far as I remember he was a bachelor that lived in a dugout and probably wanted to get rid of what he had left, because he only had a hundred acres. (Rockenbach had the entire 160; sold it to Abe Sperling Sep 1902; Sperling sold it to Fritz Krause; and Krause sold the east 100 to George P, partly contested). "Old Man" Sperling had the west 60. The Janzen family and the Rempel family, they came later on, probably between 1918 – 1920. Most of the other families were here by that time, the Kroekers, and the Grunaus and some of those, the Sperlings, but Grandpa Buller came at the same time.

Grandpa (Henry J) Buller used to live as I recall on a portion of the farm that was right west of the Mennonite Church and I think Jake Regier's grandpa had that, and they got at odds about it. I don't know if it was selling the land or moving off the farm that he had. But there was a rift between them, but as far as Grandpa (George P) Toews was concerned, I don't think he had any enemies. He was pretty stern about things when someone tried to get next to some of his better known friends, but I think he respected most people whether they were of the worldly neighbors or church people. I suppose Grandpa's (George P) best friends were Grandpa Jacob J. Voth (our G-Gpa) and his family. Grandma Toews, quite frequently when I was young, would call Great-Grandma (Anna J) Voth. I remember distinctly that she would call and then when Grandma (Anna J) Voth would answer, Grandma (Anna) Toews would say "Hello Auntje." And then they would visit at length.

Of course, I shouldn't say that they weren't at odds with some people; they were sometimes pretty bent out of shape at Uncle Pete Bullers (James Buller's Gpa) and Uncle John Bullers because they didn't want to take care of Grandpa (Henry J) Buller in his later years.

Grandpa (George P) had high respect for Great Grandpa (our G-Gpa Jacob J or GG-Gpa Jacob?) Voth's brother (Gerhard "George," brother to Jacob J), who was a leader in the church and the deacons Rempel and Harms, they visited with them and the George Voths and families. There was very little visitation with the Kroeker families and the Regier families and the Grunau families, but they did associate with the George Janzens and especially with (Mom's) Uncle Chris Voth and his wife Anna. They were very close to them when they lived on the Garold Fox farm and were shortly married.

Great Grandpa (our GG-Gpa Gerhard Isaac) Toews, when he lived in Russia lived outside of the "dorf" at a big white stone house supposedly, and was considered one of the better heeled people at that time. Great Grandpa (our GG-Gpa GI) Toews was what they called a full-fledged owner in the village and some of those shares had been divided to half shares and Grandpa (Henry J) Buller always said that when he got to that point that he was married, he was what they called a "sheet vert" ("shit's worth!") so he wound up coming to America. He was a horse trader, a dehorner of cattle and probably not the best of a businessman. He hauled bundles during the summertime in the last years to stay alive and wound up with two very decrepit horses to do his farming with and his traveling. He never owned a car.

At the time I can first remember they (Henry J & Sara Buller) were living in the house and Aunt Sarah was an old maid, a daughter of theirs who lived with them. They had chickens. Aunt Sarah was a hypochondriac who went along with Grandpa and Grandma (George P & Anna) Toews to Enid every week and had a doctor appointment with some doctor. If the doctor got tired of seeing her or didn't get enough of the chicken money, then she had to go to another one. If she didn't have wax in her ears, she had something wrong with her. Somewhere in the early 30's she married a John Penner from Nebraska who was a cousin of Grandpa (George P) Toews. After they were married, they went back to Nebraska where Penner was a welfare man more or less, made brooms and sold them. She was married 2 or 3 months and she had an attack of some kind. They took her to the doctor, and he operated on her kidney, and she never made it through the operation. Grandpa Toews found out afterwards that the doctors in Enid knew all about that she only had one kidney and that she would never make it through an operation, and they just kept kind of getting along with her. But the Nebraska doctor didn't know that, so he proceeded to operate on her. At the time Aunt Sarah got married, Grandma (Sara) Buller had already passed away, so Grandpa (Henry J) Buller moved in with us with the understanding that Uncle Henry Buller would come and get him after a month and then Uncle Pete Buller would come and take him for a month and then they would rotate. Uncle John Buller had a divorce at that time and was just a welfare person in Enid so he couldn't take care of him. Grandpa went one month to live with Uncle Henry Buller, then he lived one month with Uncle Pete Buller, then he came back to live with us. Then he said he wasn't going back to Uncle Henry Buller anymore because it was too dirty there and he probably spent one or two months yet after that over the years with Uncle Pete Buller and the rest of his life he spent living with us which meant that someone had to take care of him at all times.

He was a person who had convulsions (maybe epilepsy or worse?) at times. Before he had these convulsions, he would be very mixed up and probably say things about when he was in Russia or Nebraska. He would take out walking down the road and would sometimes be a mile away from home and then later on in the process, he would have convulsions, anywhere from two, three to ten convulsions. When the convulsions were over, he would be bedfast for 12 - 24 hours. Grandma (Anna Toews) would take care of him and then he would be up and around again.

He chopped kindling every day of the year unless it was just the worst cold. He thought that he was paying for his keep and finally one afternoon - and this is something that not any of you know. One afternoon after I was out of high school while I was supposed to be taking care of him and I was to a certain extent. I was in the dining room in the old house, and I was aware that he was in his bedroom which was in the far northwest corner of the house. I walked by the door which he never had completely closed, and I thought something was strange in there. I didn't know what to do. So I waited a little while and then I went and looked again through the door and saw that he was hanging by a rope which he had put around his neck from a coat hanger on the side of the door that was between the two little bedrooms (guest bedroom divided at the time?). At that time I called Aunt Clara and told her that Pete should come over right away. Before he came, Aunt Anna (Bush) who was teaching at Columbia School at the time, came home, and I told her. She went and got the butcher knife and cut the rope. Shortly after that time, Grandma and Grandpa Toews came back from Enid and they called the sheriff and the doctor and so forth.

The following is read by Galen Toews:

Let's move to purchase of additional land. When Uncle Pete Voth and Aunt Clara were married, they lived in the upper floor of Grandpa Voth's (Jacob J's home at the time; Jacob A living in Butler house at the time, but later moved to Jacob J's house when Jacob J moved to new house,

later home to Bob/Carol Voth) house for a year or two. Uncle Cornelius Voth had been living in the house that Garold Fox lived in for a number of years. Since Uncle Cornelius had been trained as a tractor mechanic, he was anxious not to farm and moved to Enid to work as a tractor mechanic. Uncle Pete and Aunt Clara then moved into that house.

Great Grandpa (Jacob J) Voth owned the farm that Dorothy Voth now owns. He eventually sold this farm. The north 80 was sold to Uncle Pete Voth and the south 80 was purchased by Grandpa Toews. This 80 was purchased in approximately 1926 or 1927. The next farm that was purchased was the north farm of Uncle Pete's farms. This farm had originally been owned by the Dorians which were an Irish family. This farm was sold at a bank ordered sale and was originally purchased by the owner of the Bank of Kremlin, whose name was Bradihoft. Grandpa Toews and Uncle Henry then purchased this farm from Mr. Bradihoft in 1929 or 1930 for a price of approximately \$7,000. Uncle Henry Toews sold his half interest in the north farm to Uncle Pete to raise the necessary capital to buy a house in Kremlin in 1930 or 1931, so that he had a place to live after being married. The South farm was bought from the Dorians in 1935 for \$4,250. This farm was purchased by Grandpa (George P)Toews and Uncle Jake. Money was borrowed from Omer Faller (Fowler) to buy the north farm and from Mr. Windler to buy the south farm. Mr. Windler had earned a considerable sum of money in the Garber Covington oil field.

Grandpa (George P) Toews was also involved in the Bank of Kremlin. Uncle Henry graduated from high school in 1922 and went to work in the bank approximately a year later. In 1930 / 1931 the Bank of Kremlin was insolvent. The bank was closed for a brief period of time. At this point in time, Mr. Bradihoft forfeited all of his interest in the bank and the bank became a depositor or farmer owned bank. Each of the depositors was given bank stock in return for an agreement to leave their money in the bank. At this point in time, a Board of Directors was elected to administer the bank. The Board of Directors were John Weurflein and Grandpa (George P) Toews and another unknown member. John Eger and Henry Toews were the men who were involved in the day to day banking decisions. He remained a member of this Board of Directors until his death in 1939. The Board of Directors met on a regular basis to discuss loans and the indebtedness that individuals had to the bank. The Board of Directors were elected by the depositors. Grandpa Toews was apparently elected to this Board of Directors because of the community's trust in him as he was not a majority stockholder in the bank at this time.

Grandpa (George P) Toews was also a member of the Kremlin School Board for 12 years, his term ending in 1936. (while new brick schoolhouse built!)

The ability to buy additional farms was greatly aided by coming to Oklahoma with a significant amount of capital, which was obtained from selling land in Nebraska.

Here is a little bit of information about farming narrated by David A. Toews.

First, I remember Grandpa (George P) Toews had two horses that I would term horses. They were Prince, a gelding and Bird, a mare. Then he had two horses that were half Hamiltonians. They were Barney and Daisy. Then he had two that were half broncs named Colonel and Liz and evidently must have had 2 more horses that I don't remember because he had enough horses that he could hitch 8 of them together and run two binders. Grandpa could run one and Uncle Henry could run one. Most of the machinery was drawn by 4 horses. Four horses would pull an old Ward (?) wort(?) plow, a 2/14 about 2 to 3 inches deep. They would pull a single disk and a 15 foot harrow and about a 12/8 drill that held probably 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ bushels of wheat at the very most. In later years, Dad (George P) could drive faster with the horses and put in longer hours, and plow a little bit deeper by hooking up 5 horses which meant that the one horse always walked in the furrow and if you hooked up five, the fifth horse walked on the plowed ground, the others walked on the stubble. This is the way we plowed with a 2/14 plow or a 2 disk plow which cut 20 inches.
