

DAT 10-33: Our home before the 7 May 1961 tornado – on the Half-Section Road, 1  $\frac{1}{4}$  miles W of Kremlin, OK. Note the summer kitchen/wash house, mouse house, & machine shed @ R, and pull-type M&M combine and tall elm tree @ far L. The Toews Brothers regularly played underneath both. The brooder house is visible between the back of the house and the combine.

Note newly-installed TV antenna on top of the house roof and bench from Kremlin depot on porch.



DAT 10-35: Our Mother, Rosa M Toews, with our new 1960 Chevrolet Bel Air in front of our home. Note the Kremlin CRIP depot waiting bench on the porch, kittens in the porch vents, fuse box by kitchen door & rose bush between the E steps. Chicken house is in the back at R. Toews Brothers bedroom is front-center upstairs, above open car door.



Jake Regier slides: Our house & yard after the tornado, looking ENE from Half-Section Road on the hill by George Janzen's home. Note our truck loaded with hay bales, our pale blue pickup, & a piece of barn board still stuck in elm tree by our garden patch. The pile of yellow straw bales between the house and red pickup is all that remains of our large white barn. Far L: brooder house & manure spreader. Kremlin grain elevators in background.



Jake Regier slides: "Tornado damage @ Uncle Dave & Aunt Rosa Toews Farm, April 1962" (sic). Note intact summer kitchen/wash house, mouse house, machine shed, w/ brooder house behind house at L. Chickens too! Piece of house roof w/gutters in L foreground & screen door and porch bench in front.



Another view of our heavily damaged home after the 7 May 1961 tornado, taken from inside our garden patch, looking NW [source unknown]. Note storm debris in the woven-wire fence. Our summer kitchen/wash house and "mouse house" at R largely escaped any damage – only the chimney for our mea grope was toppled from the summer kitchen roof. Also note several white boards at L driven into our lawn by the storm.



Jake Regier slide: Our house & summer kitchen/wash house after the tornado. Note roof fragment (probably from house) & part of steel grain bin in foreground & "old fort/spaceship" 2-holer behind/between house & wash house @ rear. Swing set is intact, as are cisterns.



TORNADO0001: View of our house and summer kitchen a few days after the tornado. Toews Brother's bedroom top L & hallway top R; "junk room" behind hallway upstairs. Dining room bottom L & kitchen & bathroom bottom R. Slide source unknown.



DAT 11-20: Our house after the tornado, looking NNE from our lawn. Note carpet drying on lawn. Mom & Dad's bedroom is top L & Toews Brother's bedroom top R. "Junk Room" behind Mom & Dad's bedroom. Living room is lower L and dining room is lower R. "Guest bedroom" is behind living room. Summer kitchen, our truck w/hay, & our pickup on garage foundation at far R



DAT 11-18: Upstairs after the tornado – Toews Brother's bedroom door @ L, Mom & Dad's bedroom door @ R. Note wallpaper and plaster laths in the boy's bedroom, and Carolina Blue sky @top center.



DAT 11-19: Upstairs after the tornado – Toews Brother's bedroom door @ L, Mom & Dad's bedroom door @ R. Note wallpaper and plaster laths in the boy's bedroom, and Carolina Blue sky @top center.



Jake Regier slide: Our house, summer kitchen, mouse house, concrete outhouse seat in front of propane tank, & machine shed, looking S from near steel grain bins. Note Co-op feed sacks, Galen's "Wheels" above stock tank, junk pile, clothesline in front of wash house, our pickup on garage foundation.



DAT 11-21: Machine shed with missing N side annex, looking W from near pig pen. Note 2 steel grain bins – one distorted w/roof missing, pull-type Case combine, windmill & "water-heater" water trough (far R). Roll of cribbing for top of silo at far L.



DAT 11-22: View of barn remains, house, summer kitchen, brooder house, mouse house, chicken house & machine shed, looking W from pasture. Note our truck full of hay bales & other farm trucks. George Janzen windmill visible just L of our swing set. Our pickup is on garage foundation.



Jake Regier slide: Remains of our big white barn, looking NNE from our corral. Note destroyed OG&E electric substation on 12 Acres, OG&E trucks, & Ruben & Sophie Thesman's place @ back. There are dead sheep under the pile of bales and dying sheep to the L.



Jake Regier slide: Close-up of barn remains & hay bales on hayloft floor. Metal corral gate and gate-post is in foreground, under wooden gate



Our WD-9 McCormick-Deering tractor on the barn foundation after most debris has been cleared away. Note the corral gatepost and gate have been re-installed (in front of tractor). Ruben & Sophie Thesman farmstead at far L; destroyed substation in center rear behind post.



Jake Regier slide: Feedlot, feeder, silo, & silo shed, looking NE from our wheat field, beside the steel grain bins. Note ladder and top crib railing, silo blocks, cattle "oiler" attached to power pole, sheep in the pasture, & downed wheat. Who is that man?



Jake Regier slide: Silo shed & silo, looking NNE – note ladder and top crib railing hanging on roof, silo blocks, & pickup stock rack @ extreme R. Ruben & Sophie Thesman home at back L.



An early photo following our May 1961 tornado – steers are still in what is left of our feedlot. Despite all the heavy concrete silo blocks littering the feedlot, none of the steers were injured!



TORNAD00002: Silo shed and silo showing intact ensilage where blocks have been torn away. Feedlot w/clueless steers and self-feeder at far R. None were seriously injured & they stayed inside the electric fence even though no electricity. Sheep @ L & pig shed thru silo shed doors.

\*manure spreader (front of silo shed) plow (by one-way) & drill (extreme r) are also visible

TORNADO0003: Looking N from our garden patch towards the silo shed. Barn was at near R. Note our pickup on the garage foundation and garage roof to the R. Part of a steel grain bin roof is between pickup & roof. Our truck w/bales and one-way @ back, in front of silo shed\*.





This same 7 May 1961 tornado also wrought havoc on the farmstead of George Janzen,  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile W of our home. Although the house and wash house were largely spared, the barn, shed, and other outbuildings were completely obliterated. This 1958 aerial photograph, looking ESE, was kindly furnished by Dennis Toews, grandson of George and Anna Janzen. The "Half-Section" road is just to the I of the left edge of the photo. The house was moved to Kremlin in the early 1960s.



DAT 12-22: We salvaged lots of lumber from the house and barn and pulled lots of nails to build a very nice house along the Kremlin blacktop. Most all of the studs, lots of the floor and ceiling joists, & yes, roof sheeting too (barn siding), were from our house and barn! [~1962-63]




This is a composite panorama of 2 pictures taken from the top of our silo looking S, 10 or more years after it was rebuilt following the tornado that took our house and barn in May 1961. The new sheep barn (N half is our old chicken house) is @ L - it sits on our old barn foundation. Our former garden patch with its elm trees is above our red pickup. Pig shed is @ lower center R, and summer kitchen, house porch/pillars, & mouse house are all visible. George Ediger pasture/wheat field is at upper I and George Janzen wheat field is at upper r.

## Although the 40'x72' Morton building was destroyed, the flimsy white lean-to attached to its 5 wall survived intact (visible @ back L). See also next page.

Also note the bed frame in front of the silo – when I was in high school, this was used to convert our pickup into a "camper" with the addition of a tarp for cover. It fit perfectly in the holes for the stock rack on the pickup bed. Double mattress fit pickup bed perfectly. Great Salt Plains – here we come!

## Our 2<sup>nd</sup> tornado! (Summer, 2009)

In the late summer of 2009, our silo shed again suffered major tornado damage, and our sheep barn was totally destroyed. This is the same tornado that destroyed the Morton building by our second home on the Kremlin blacktop (visible @ back L below) - currently owned by Mike & Janet Streck.

Photos of our destroyed sheep barn after a late summer, 2009 tornado. Our heavily damaged silo shed is at back center in the photo at L.

Note our machine shed at center back of R photo - it withstood both tornados and lots more, but finally succumbed to the elements and to our removal of siding for the interior of our new bunkhouse on the Houghtaling Farm. Also note the corner of original concrete barn foundation at lower L and the intact light bulb on the destroyed roof section in this photo.





In the late summer of 2009, our silo shed again suffered tornado damage, and our sheep barn was destroyed. My brothers Galen (L) and Myron (R) are shown posing by the ruins of our sheep barn, shortly after the tornado. Our pole barn, constructed on the Kremlin blacktop after our 1961 tornado, and new home (now owned by Mike and Janet Streck) are visible at back R in the left photo.

The carcass of the barn owl was found as shown, "impaled" on the barbed wire fence W of the silo and silo shed. Owls still nest and nurture their young inside the silo.

And finally, slides of a 5 June 1966 tornado, taken by my Uncle Jake Regier from his front yard

As you will see, there were actually two funnels on this sunny Sunday afternoon.

It is worth remembering that these photos were taken 50 years before the advent of ubiquitous cell-phone cameras, so to me that makes these photos quite amazing. I believe Uncle Jake had an Argus C-3 camera for his slide photos.

Also note that the best slides of the 7 May 1961 tornado that destroyed our home and barn were taken by Jake Regier as well – we owe Uncle Jake a great debt for his excellent photography, well ahead of his time.

For some time-perspective, I had just graduated from Kremlin High School in May 1966.



Slide (#3) taken by my Uncle Jake Regier from his front yard on 5 June 1966. Note the oil well, custom harvester's combines, and bright sunshine. This was a Sunday afternoon and Ellis Toews was at our place visiting with me – we watched this tornado from our patio, but thought it was only a big dust devil! This is the tornado that wrought havoc on Uncle Jake and Aunt Ann Toews' farmstead.



A second, slightly later photo taken on 5 June 1966 – note the cattle grazing in the pasture and sun shining on the oil tanks at center. The Jake Rempel home-place is at left. [slides 8 & 11]

Following slides are from earlier in the sequence – these first two seem most dramatic.


